Pastor's Article



I grew up in San Diego in a suburb on a steep hill, so our real neighbors were the ones who lived so close to us that they wouldn't get out of breath walking up the street to say hi. My aunt Debbie and Uncle Pete live across the street in the cul-de-sac; Pete and my dad were in the Air Force together in Phoenix, AZ when my parents were newlyweds and our 2 families have always lived less than a mile apart. High school classmates of mine, are now friends with my brother's family.

When I hear people tell stories about the neighborhoods they grew up in, one of things I hear most is memories of how people's neighborhoods used to be. "I remember when I lived on a street where everyone knew everybody's name." or "I remember when people sat on front porches and talked to people when they walked by," "I remember when I used to go ask my neighbors for an egg, or a cup of sugar " or "I remember block parties."

Being a good neighbor was common in American neighborhoods. But over the years we have been driven inside our homes or into our fenced in back yards. There are lots of reasons for this: busyness, television, fear... They have all pushed us towards more isolation. As the world grows more connected, our neighbors are closer than ever, but technology and just living next to someone doesn't really make them your neighbor.

The truth is, someone who chooses to engage with their neighbors is going against the grain. It may be considered weird, or invasive, it will most certainly be different and set us apart. But there is a void in our neighborhoods, and it is one that God is calling us to fill just by making the choice to love our neighbors, our literal next door neighbors. You might not share a fence, but you can share their burdens and joys.

God has placed you in this time and in this place.

Have you ever stopped to think about why you live where you live? Why did you move where you did? We moved to Michigan, not only to serve a great church, but because this community was a great place to raise kids. Many of the outdoor activities such as camping and hiking that we enjoyed about growing up in Southern California, we can also enjoy year round in Michigan, but we have to wear heavier jackets.

Think about the street that you live on, your apartment or condo. If we were each to make a map of our own neighborhood and mark the houses of the people on our street, (a black question mark for people we don't know, red for the people that we don't know well, yellow for the people that we are getting to know, and green for the people that we know really well...how many houses on our streets would be marked with a black question mark or red because we don't know them?)

Your place is marked on this map, and your place has been marked out by God. You have neighbors whose place has been marked out by God. If we were to zoom in to your street, you would see a lot of places where there is no marker. Why? You know why...many of your neighbors don't know Jesus! God has placed them in this time and this place, and if they want reach out to Him, they will find Him. And if you are willing to love your neighbor, maybe God will use you to help your neighbors find God. The first key to choosing to love your neighbor is to recognize that God has placed you in this time and this place. To be a part of God's plan for your neighbor and to be a witness of Jesus Christ requires some effort on your part.



Make new friends, not new projects

I have seen all too often the misnomer that our call to be witnesses and love our neighbors is turned into projects to convert people. Somewhere along the line, we have come to believe that it is our responsibility to convict people of their sins and make them believe in Jesus. As a result, the perception of the Church has become an unloving, intolerant and unaccepting place; where people feel judged, not loved. We are being asked to love our neighbors, not to judge them nor convert them. The Holy Spirit does the converting, and only God is righteous enough to do the judging. Rather than be weighed down by the burden to judge and convert, God has freed us to simply love our neighbors. We can become friends with our neighbor, whether

they agree with us or not, whether they are like us or not.

If our motive to love people is to get them converted, then it is just a matter of time before we dump them for the next project, but that is not who we are. We don't love people to convert them; we love people because we are converted. We have literally been given a new heart, one that loves like Jesus loves. No expectation for return, an unconditional, selfless love.

We go from stranger to acquaintance, and then from acquaintance to a relationship. And to move toward a relationship, we need to invest and invite our neighbors. There are so many opportunities to invite and hang out with my neighbors. Sometimes the easiest thing to do is invite people into something you are already doing! If you are going to walk up to Fenton House to get an ice cream cone, go knock on your neighbor's door and invite them to go with you.

God has placed you in this time, in this place. He has placed your neighbors next door to you, and has asked you to love them. And then, when your neighbors do reach out and seek God, just maybe you will get to help them find Him.

What does it mean to Neighbor? Here are some good ideas from our members:

The good neighbor installed an electric generator switch for a neighbor down the road after several power outages.

Helped a single middle-aged Mom with two teenagers at home by repairing her heating system, fixing electrical problems, and correcting plumbing issues. He gave wood for her outside wood stove to help heat her home. He found wood and brought her friend; together they sawed and transported many trailer loads of wood back to her home for the following winter. In addition, he repaired her lawn mower several times and mowed her lawn many times when the mower was finally broken.

The good neighbor has anonymously, paid for several veterans' meals while eating at restaurants.

The good neighbor has used his tractor and pulled several floats for different community organizations in local parades.

The good neighbor used his tractor to pull the neighbor's tractor out of his pond when it slipped on wet grass.

Helped a disabled Viet-Nam Veteran whose health is failing by plowing his driveway, mowing his grass, and taking in the trash cans after garbage pick-up

The good neighbor has befriended an Army veteran who was seriously affected by his time in service; the veteran is a "loner" and prefers to be by himself in a quiet area in the country. The good neighbor has offered his back acreage that is wooded. He also started an account at a local store for the veteran and has purchased some supplies for him

The good neighbor brought cold pop to the tree trimmers who were trimming trees for DTE so there would be fewer electrical power outages.

He visits an 85 year old widower and plows his driveway in the winter.

BLOOD DRIVE June 2nd, 2018



Library Committee

Curious about how our current library mission came to be? After our renovation, Sue Berry served as our first librarian in the new space. With a different layout, library space became limited and we observed that less folks were taking advantage of books available. After Sue & Mike moved south, no one was available to oversee library function. The Christian Education Committee felt that this would naturally fit their scope of work; in 2016 the library fell under the guidance of CE. With the help of librarian Kim Wilcox (John & Linda Banks' daughter), a final comprehensive inventory was done and books that were no longer current, in good condition, or relevant to the spiritual growth of our congregation were removed. Some of those books were "In Memoriam" books and they have either been offered back to families or are currently kept in the office. New books are being purchased to replace them.

Jennifer MacLean took over as librarian in 2016 and, with input from Pastors, CE, and Tina Ritchie, a policy was developed to clarify mission and content that fit the objective of building people up in their faith. The Library Committee was formed, and a wish list was

also created to assist Deacons in choosing "In Memoriam" books that fit the new scope of the library. In order to make books more accessible to everyone, an anonymous donor purchased a library cart for Fellowship Hall.

Nikki Curtis is our current librarian, and committee members are Linda Banks, Nikki Black, and Pam Coffin. Because our library remains dynamic and relevant, these ladies oversee inventory, assist with researching and purchasing new books, and remove outdated or worn our books. Anyone wishing to donate books to the library may do so with the understanding that if the book does not fit the criteria, it may not be used. Many new books have been purchased that edify our faith – please stop by to see all that our library has to offer!



Twelve families participated in the Love and Logic Communication Skills Workshop on Sunday, April 22nd. We are grateful to trained facilitator Lori Arthur (Julie Grams sister) for travelling across the state to lead the adult portion. Here is an example from our discussion:

Lessons Learned from a Little Arguing by Pastor Lindsey

Every parent or grandparent has tricks up their sleeve for when they reach an impasse with a child...and sometimes they stop working.

The Love and Logic seminar gave me some new things to try. Love and Logic reminded me that "lectures have never worked for any parent in the entire history of humankind." (I knew it, but still do it.) Instead of getting into a losing argument, or having it become a battle of the wills, or do it because I told you so, as an adult stop feeding the argument with words and fuel. Go "brain dead" and calmly pick a one-liner statement to repeat, as the child exhausts themselves.

Child: "It's not fair!" or "That's stupid!" or "I don't care!" (avoid sarcasm, and show empathy) Adult Response:

"I love you too much to argue with you about that."

"Could be." or "Probably so." or "True." or "I'm afraid so."

"I bet it feels that way." or "I know."

Child Response: "I'm not doing it, and you can't make me!" (avoid a stalemate, but state your expectation)

Adult Response: "There's no hurry, just have it done before soccer."

"Take your time. I only expect it done before the bedtime."

"Don't worry about it now."

Youth in 6-12 grades met with Tina Ritchie in the Youth Room. The discussion included:

- 1. Naming behaviors of parents and identifying the beliefs those behaviors reveal
- 2. Listing the character traits in their parents that they respect loving was the most reported trait
- 3. Sharing who they are most like and how mom, dad, or both
- 4. Listing healthy respectful ways to communicate listening was the most reported skill
- 5. Naming feeling experienced regularly and thinking about where those feelings are felt in our bodies
- 6. Looking at various body language and identifying possible feelings. Ex. Tears could mean sadness, embarrassment, frustration, angry, overwhelmed, etc.
- 7. Learning how to use "I" statements that places responsibility for your feelings on yourself, creates understanding and builds the relationship. The model we worked with is:

I FEEL	
WHEN	
BECAUSE	
AND I NEED	

For example:

Instead of saying, "You never listen to me! You just think life is easy and I should be able to handle all this stress and be perfect. You expect too much and I hate you!"

Say, "I get frustrated when I don't feel heard. I feel really stressed because of all the expectations at school and home. I need you to understand my feelings, and help me learn to manage my time and stress."


Last month we looked at nine Activity Areas for family growth. An important piece to building capable kids, strong relationships, and healthy communication is listening. Here is an excerpt from the poem "Listen" by Ray Houghton. Please consider how this simple act could be a gift to all people in your life.

When I ask you to listen to me and you start giving advice, you have not done what I asked.

When I ask you to listen to me and you begin to tell me why I should not feel that way, you are trampling on my feelings.

When I ask you to listen to me and you feel you have to do something to solve my problems, you have failed me, strange as that may seem.

Listen! All I asked was to listen to me – not talk or do – just hear me, please.



And I can do for myself; I am not helpless. Maybe discouraged and faltering, but not helpless.

When you do something for me that I can do and need to do for myself, you contribute to my fear and inadequacy.

But when you accept as a simple fact that I do feel, no matter how irrational, then I can quit trying to convince you and get about this business of understanding what is behind this irrational feeling.

When that's clear – the answers are obvious and I don't need advice. Irrational feelings make sense when we understand what's behind them.

So, please listen and hear me, and if you want to talk, wait a minute for your turn – I will listen to you.

Jesus teaches us that self-control is very important in making sure that we do the right thing, the first time.

"The Lord's Prayer" - Children kindergarten - 5th grade meet together

The Lord's Prayer is a prayer presented by Jesus as a model prayer in response to the disciples' request that Jesus teach them how to pray. It also unites all Christians and embraces all forms of prayer including praise and acknowledgement of God's greatness, confession, thanksgiving and petition. When we pray, we are opening ourselves to God, stating what is in our hearts and listening to what God wants us to do. It is very personal and interactive; a person who recognizes that God is present in their life can actually communicate with the eternal God who wants to be active in that person's life.

The first part of the prayer affirms the relationship. We call on God as a loving parent. As we enter into prayer, we are reminded that we are entering holy space. Being human, we know that we are subject to temptation and the choice to walk a path that leads us away from God. We pray that God's kingdom will become a reality on earth. We ask that our daily needs be met. We ask for forgiveness, reminding ourselves that we must forgive. How wonderful is this eternal, omnipotent God!

Anytime we say this prayer, a particular phrase may seem to speak to us more than the others. The next time we pray, it may be a different phrase. As we say this prayer, we know that we are bonded in fellowship and grace with other believers all over the world. We live in a time, as always, when the world is divided on many issues and the Church is divided into many denominations. What a gift Jesus gave us to have a prayer that speaks to us and is one upon which we can all agree!
