Pastor's Article

Asocial Media

I hope it's a beautiful day in your neighborhood. I also hope that your sense of neighborhood is growing because your neighbors need you. Have you considered that the people that you interact with on the internet are your neighbors? They need you too.

It is of little surprise that an article from the Economist reports that social media is found to give an 'extra scope for self-expression and community-building. But [these] platforms exacerbated anxiety and depression.' The same article cites sleep deprivation, exposure to bullying, and body image concerns as some of the result, and highlight a previously-unknown-to-me condition of FOMO ("fear of missing out").

It would be simple to assume that this is solely an issue for younger people who do not remember a time in which much of their interaction with the world was through people rather than pixels. However, all of us are effected by social media, no matter what age. All who use social media are capable of being effected negatively by it, no matter our age. 2.2 billion people used Facebook in the month of March, 2018 according to Facebook. Those weren't just young people. The topic of Social Media is no longer a 'youth' issue, but a concern for everyone.

This is a concern because we are realizing that the efforts to benefit financially from the way we communicate with other people by Big Tech Companies do not provide moral guidelines, and traditional moral guidelines can be woefully inadequate. We cannot believe everything that our 'friends' share with us. We cannot assume that the things we 'share', whether visual or verbal will not be taken out of context. We struggle to understand the meaning of an image and find ourselves aligning with 'movements' as a way of expression and communication. We find ourselves seeking to define ourselves by **how** we communicate rather than **what** we communicate.

Chamath Palihapitiya was the Vice President for user growth for Facebook who left the company in 2011. He has raised concerns about the effects of Social Media on society. Using computing terms, he describes Social Media Providers as 'programming' its users and 'exploiting a vulnerability in human psychology'. He even goes so far as describing himself as a 'conscientious objector' to social media.

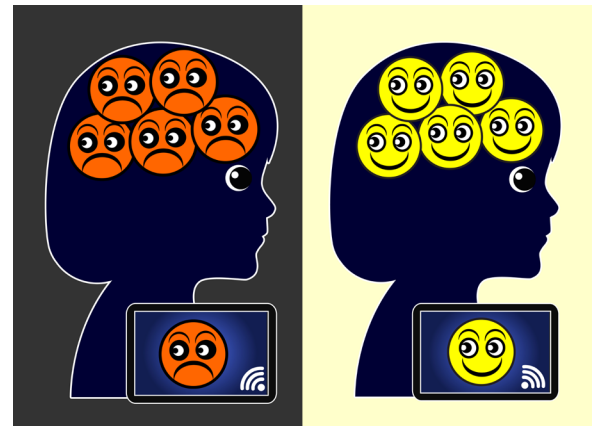

"It literally is a point now where I think we have created tools that are ripping apart the social fabric



of how society works. That is truly where we are,” he said. “The short-term, dopamine-driven feedback loops that we have created are destroying how society works: no civil discourse, no cooperation, misinformation, mistruth. And it’s not an American problem. This is not about Russian ads. This is a global problem.”

While Palihapitiya will admit that Facebook ‘overwhelmingly does good in the world’, he feels a large amount of guilt for what he perceives as damage to society that he participated in creating.



For many of you this isn’t new news. We have heard of the multiple misuses of Social Media from bullying to hacking and we have all experienced the benefit of connection with friends and a wider world. The potential harm that engaging in Social Media brings must be weighed with the potential benefits, lest we misuse a tool or overly isolate ourselves. The profound ability to connect with others has allowed for families and friends to maintain close connection over vast geographical distance. Yet, this same connectivity brings ample opportunity for one-sided arguments and leads to distortion of truth and perspective. Connection to people is a great value, connection to 2 billion people can lead to anxiety or worse, mental illness.

Personally, I have struggled with Social Media. I understand full well the idea of a feedback loop, especially when I think about how I consume YouTube videos. I avoided Facebook for several months now because I have not been able to separate the artificial and manipulated connections with the honest and human connections. I fear engaging with newer forms of Social Media such as Instagram, Snapchat and Twitter. I regret the time that I spend wastefully consuming ‘communication’. I feel like I am in Social Media Recovery, not trusting myself to maintain sobriety.

The Bible, I am afraid, does not say much about Facebook, but how as Christians can we maintain a healthy balance? How do we cultivate a healthy digital neighborhood?

Firstly, there is the issue of the misuse of Social Media. Bullying, misinformation, and online etiquette aren’t just for high school students and Russian spies. How much are you contributing to the negative aspects of Social Media? Do you post links that you have not fact checked? Have you shared a negative opinion about someone or a company without personally communicating with the person or company you have a beef with? And then, have you considered not to share that negative experience in spite of the wrong you felt? Have you used foul language in Social Media? DO YOU TYPE IN ALL CAPS? These are just some of the activities that contribute to the negative aspects of Social Media. Christians are normal people, but we are also called to make the world a better place. How can we make Social Media better? How can we be good neighbors?


Secondly, there is the issue of overuse of Social Media. How many friends do you have on Facebook? How many followers on Instagram or Twitter? Does it matter to you? Are you sure it doesn’t? Have you ever posted something on Social Media with the sole purpose of gathering ‘likes’ or those little hearts? I have. On one hand, this can be really shallow. On the other it is deceptively addictive. We have been exposed to a new type of pixelated stimuli and we behave in addictive ways to it. I have counseled married couples who feel that they have lost their spouse to Facebook or other corners of the internet. This is because Social Media is designed to attract us and it has been designed so well we struggle with coping with it.

Before you complain about teenagers using crosswalks while texting, reflect in your own activity. Social Media isn't just Instagram. It is Facebook, Twitter, WhatsApp, Texts, Emails, and online games. It is anything that 'pushes' information to your inbox. Social Media is any method of communication or social interaction that is done over the internet. Those old email chain letters? That is Social Media. Your non-graphic-intensive online Hearts game: Social Media. To whatever degree you receive information through electronic means you are engaging in Social Media.

I'm not sure Jesus would suggest that you cut all ties to the internet to save your soul. We are called to be in the world. But we aren't called to be of it. How do we remain healthy, and even more importantly, how do we remain faithful in this brave new digital neighborhood of ours?

In the same way that we try to be good neighbors, I think we need to concentrate on the value of authentic relationships. While some are called to be hermits, Jesus doesn't call us all to avoid relationships. We should be able to know our neighbors in the digital neighborhood. We need to not only interact in ways that keep ourselves safe and healthy, but we should look out for other's safety and health as well. We should look out for our neighbor's reputation and do our best to be up-lifting. We should be willing to express our feelings authentically and in ways that invite input because we expect to have to live with the people that we interact with. Just as we try to cultivate the fruit of the Spirit in our physical neighborhoods, how can we grow love, joy, peace, patience, goodness, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control in our digital neighborhoods?

Grant Update

Thank you to all who participated in the church wide surveys we did together this past month in June. It is good to share our thoughts, and fascinating to think about who we are as a church and who God is calling us to be.

A small group of people gathered the following Sunday afternoon to prayerfully consider what all of the information you gave to us could mean and what God might be calling us to do. These people were chosen to represent a wide age range within our church, as well as diversity of areas of ministry within FFPC. Because we are only just beginning this process we do not have a clear idea of what the next steps are, but the following represents some of the responses from this information. Please also note that these thoughts are only a beginning and certainly not the definitive facts on who we are or who we should be. These thoughts are organized by specific questions given by the grant process.



What are we planting in the Garden? What are our hopes and dreams for our Youth Ministry?

We hope to foster a **faith and spirituality** that is focused on Jesus, highlights forgiveness and provides direction and growth for our younger members. We have a vision to nurture a love that is unconditional and that is accepting and kind. Through all this we would create a **space** to be creative, to gain self-esteem, and to get guidance. This space would be for stability, for listening to each other, and a sense of belonging.

We seek to develop mission and service that involves others, that gives us a safe place to experiment and risk, and that empowers and equips each of us for leadership. This would be accomplished by providing trained and willing leaders, volunteers and role models. We also want to develop a **perspective** that comes from **self-reflection**. Reflecting individually, and also, as a group on the programs and ministries that we build as to their effectiveness and purpose.

- Ministry should **celebrate** each one's gifts, talents, lives, and opinions through worship, living together, on missions, and at home and special events.
- Ministry should be connecting older and younger people together.
- On a more practical note the focus group should meet 3-4 times a month. Leaders should meet 4-6 times a year to discuss new ideas and evaluate program direction.

In our Community Structure what are our Steel Beams? What are our strengths and supporting structures? What would lead us to success in reshaping our Ministry? Our community (both inside the church and outside) is largely blue collar being employed by companies like GM and some being currently or retired farmers. We are politically mixed and mostly white. We see ourselves as middle aged, family oriented and with limited cultural diversity. Our church has a wide reach that covers three counties and we excel at **hospitality**.

- Our Leadership, both formal and informal, is focused on mentorship and developing other leaders. Our Session, Pastors and other leaders are involved in envisioning our future.
- We strive to have a space to be heard, known and accepted.
- We have parents who are seeking to understand youth and love them.
- We have a strong faith given to us by God which is our strong foundation, and we have a faith community that is committed to living out their faith.

Do we have termites? What are our weaknesses?

- We tend to be insular and we need outside organizations to help us grow and expand our perspectives.
- We lack a sense of sustainability and depend too much on too few trained leaders and trusted mentors.
- We lack enough volunteers and we do not have good engagement with young adults (those out of high school).
- We lack info about young people: their desires, values, challenges, etc...
- We lack up to date technology (i.e. website, etc...)
- We lack excitement that leads to commitment and priority change.
- We tend to have adult-ish rigidity and don't want to change our old ways. This should be bulldozed. Good things should be kept, but new things should be considered.
- We fail to make one to one invitations and instead depend on general announcements.

What size is our property lot? How Big or What are our opportunities?

- We have an opportunity to connect all ages.
- There is energy and excitement about making good things happen.
- We have a little bit of money to work with due to memorial gifts and a generous congregation.
- We have people who are skilled in consulting and time management training, as well as recruiting skills.
- 10% of our budget goes to Youth Ministry
- We have strong leadership of a few families (we would love more!)
- We have an opportunity to invite more leaders into meaningful engagement.
- The issue of being busy and having skewed priorities is abundant. The church has an opportunity biblically and theologically to speak to that.

Danger Zone: What are our Threats?

- Tendency to not look and be reflective about past and present failures.
- School bullying, community abuse of illicit drugs.
- Resistance to inter-generational involvement
- Declining membership
- Travel Sports keeps family calendars full
- Several high schools over large area and it is difficult to manage different school calendars and events.
- Faith formation in children is not a family priority in favor of sports and vacation.
- Negative perception of church by non-members
- Two working parent households which leads to a lessened ability to volunteer and encourage kids to be involved.
- Young adults and some youth are working +40 hours a week, and many have multiple jobs. This leads to less time to attend to spiritual formation.
- Young adults experience a lack of stability financially, in health care, and in housing compared to older adults, leading them to feel estranged from the general life of the church and feel threatened or uninterested when asked to be a bigger part of the life of the church. This can be frustrating for older adults who are not only experiencing different life stages, but remember life stage transitions being much different when they grew up.

Dumpster/Recycling Pile: What do we need to stop and/or start immediately?

- As we work we need to focus more on involving more people to gain from their perspective and experience less burnout. This could be called growing a culture of participation.
- We need to encourage adult participation

- We need to be aware of opposition to changes and work for understanding and mutual support of concerns.
- We need to stop calling it Youth Ministry and label it Church Ministry. Recognizing the holistic nature of ministry to youth is vital. Without the entire church addressing the needs of the rest of the church we will not be as successful as we could be at ministry to young people.
- We need to focus on personal invitation when addressing church communication.

Therefore we should:

- Stop segregating by age in the life of the church. While having age specific events is okay, we should image each and every event is for everyone.
- Stop labeling groups in the church and attend to individuals.
- Move from a few voices to more people
- Stop talking to youth only about youth things and include a wider variety of concerns when speaking to youth (i.e. speaking about adult issues with youth as well as youth topics)
- Stop thinking that adults know what youth need. Adults need to listen to youth.

Parking Lot: We need more time to talk about this.

- Experienced People: the opinions of everyone are needed for a ministry that represents the whole congregation. This could look like a mission/outreach discussion.
- Formal Evaluation: quarterly meetings to ask quantitative questions which would also include the youth in evaluating the program and direction.
- What does it mean to stop using the term Youth Ministry and concentrate on Church Ministry?

Why are we the Church to do This?

- We are a mixture of ages, activities, interests with an overlaying message of faith.
- We are a community of prayer: to discern God's will for our church. Prayerfully we look at trends within our community and neighborhood. Examine the past and seek good advice from outside sources.

We think that these questions are important:

- Are we doing God's work? Fitting into God's will?
- Do we know why we are doing certain things?
- Are we actually helping?
- Are the people we are ministering to growing?
- Are the programs we have producing interest?

We want to be a community of Empathy:

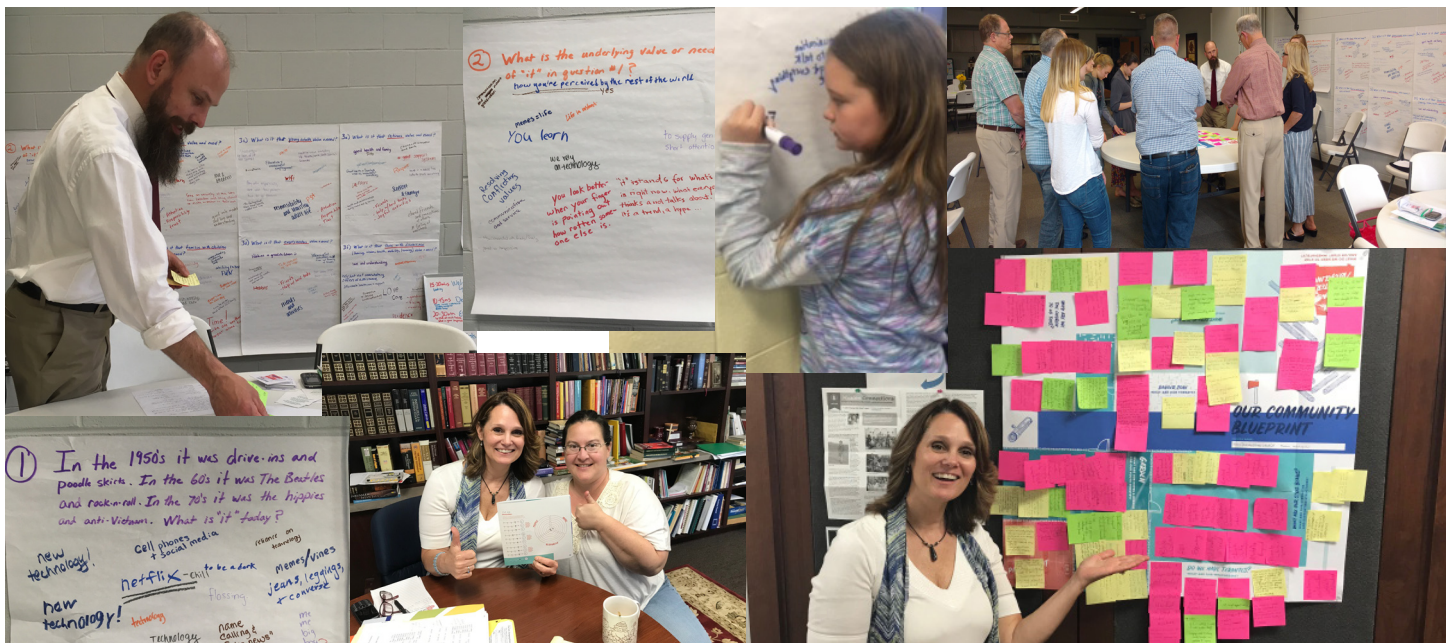
- Openness to new ideas and points of view
- Openness to shifting programs
- Openness to research and community demographics
- We want to really exhibit the Kingdom of God
- We are a church that is learning how to reflect on our ministry.
- People have found their niche here, actively participating and finding ways to offer their gifts to God and each other.
- We are growing in faith and so we share, teach, equip and encourage.

What do you think young people need today?

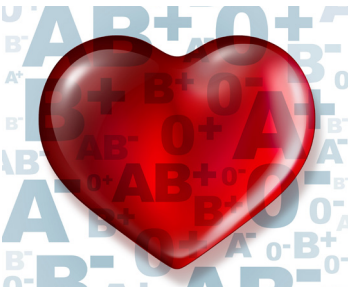
- Guidance, freedom of self expression, love, respect
- Jobs, stability, courage, hope, an example
- To feel they're loved and respected
- Elementary: Jesus Parables and wisdom; middle school: unconditional love; high school/develop personal faith/action/ministry; college/post/support group for life's choices
- Unconditional love: that God loves them and is always there for them
- An encouraging opinion from a non-family member
- Patience
- Structure and guidance with loving limits
- The ability to share with others to create understanding; confidence to start conversations; good teachers of life, world and subjects
- Acceptance without judgement; direction; accountability; able to mature and be strong adults

What do you think Youth Ministry should be like today?

- A place for young people to learn about themselves, their faith, and the love God and the community have for them, as well as a place for them to share their gifts and experience others
- Faith into works: help Church programs, church work programs, church faith building camps
- It needs to be relatable to what kids are experiencing in their daily lives
- Should be a safe space; honest communication to be able to discuss their doubts; leadership opportunities to help shape their faith
- Activity based with reflection
- A place to explore; spiritual connections; learning about Jesus; mission and service
- Joyful, being open yet quiet/reflective to listen and share
- Build up family and church; help provide a clear vision for life
- Provide opportunities for expression; to lead; to expand what they are learning; to have a voice in the church; youth should be able to plan their own activities
- It should incorporate everyday living and connect that to God. It should make youth feel proud to be connected to God, and they should be able to share without feeling judged

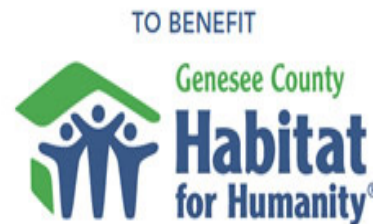


Red Cross Blood Drive on June 2, 2018

THE GOSPEL PROJECT FOR KIDS

New Sunday School Curriculum Beginning in September by Tina Ritchie

This Jesus-centered curriculum is a three-year, chronological study of the Bible designed to do the following:

1. Promote Gospel transformation, not behavioral modification: Every session points us to the gospel of Jesus Christ as the source of heart-transformation and the foundation for spiritual growth.
2. See how the whole Bible fits together: From Genesis to Revelation, we will understand how the entire story of the Bible reveals God's plan of redemption through Jesus Christ.
3. Unite every age in Christ-centered study: If desired, this provides curriculum for all ages birth through adult.
4. Compel Christ followers to live on mission: Every session is developed to help us know God more and to learn of God's missionary heart – encouraging us to join in the story by sharing Jesus with the world.
5. Understand the key themes of Christianity: Each session helps us acknowledge essential theological doctrines of the Christian faith as they are found throughout the Bible.

When we truly experience the gospel, our hearts are transformed. When we get it, everything changes.

Preschoolers & Kids will have age appropriate lessons and quarterly "Big Picture Cards for Families" that assist discussion and learning at home. Classes will be held on Sunday mornings.

Middle and High School Students will discover not only what they believe, but also why they believe it with lessons that center their lives on the gospel. This includes a "Family Connection" take home discussion sheet for each lesson. Classes will be held during youth group meetings on Sunday evenings.

In August adults will have the opportunity to sign-up to teach this curriculum. There will be a review and training of curriculum. If you are unsure OR confident of your Biblical knowledge, then this is the opportunity for you to SHARE, LEARN, AND GROW IN YOUR OWN FAITH! Children's classes will have three ages groups consisting of preschool, younger kids (k-2nd), and older kids (3-5th). Lessons are given quarterly, therefore we are looking for 3-4 adults per age group to facilitate each group. Shepherds are also needed, and youth may fill those roles. There will also be opportunities to facilitate lessons for youth group. **Please prayerfully consider how you might be a part of this new adventure in learning about and loving Jesus and one another.**

Children kindergarten – 5th grade are learning about The Lord's Prayer. July lesson highlights are below:

July 1: Eat Your Way through the Bible explores how “daily bread” translates into our general nutritional needs, and asks, “Do we really understand how God continues to provide for us?”

July 8: Buck Denver video part 1- God's Perfect Timing The children will learn about the 400 years between the Old and New Testaments, and how Jesus arrived at just the perfect time.

July 15: Faith Today The children will learn that we must forgive others as God forgives us by considering fences and bridges as symbols of separation and connection to one another.

July 22: Mary & Martha's Bed & Breakfast explores the power of forgiveness through the story of Corrie Ten Boom. She was a Christian woman imprisoned in a Nazi Concentration Camp for sheltering Jews during the Holocaust.

July 29: Moved by the Spirit experiments with body postures to discover how physical attitudes can affect emotional responses in our prayer life.
