What Neighborhood Did Christ Die For?

There is a profound quote from the book <u>"Life Together"</u> by Dietrich Bonhoeffer that, for the life of me, I can't find, but the quote goes something like this: Many of us have a vision about what our church should be and actively work toward making that vision come about. We want our church to be welcoming and friendly. We want our pastors to be exhortative and kind. We want the ministries and missions of the church to be effective, powerful and relevant to the community at large and the world beyond. We have a clear vision that almost every Sunday is violated by the reality of the church we attend.

As we struggle to meet our vision of the church in the body of believers that we have committed to and in the daily rhythms of our own lives we must ask the question: "What church did Christ die for?" The answer is: this one. It is the one that we attend. It is the one that is fractured and confused by multiple denominations. It is the one that is led by human beings who are all to often blind to needs other than their own. The church that Christ died for is not the one that we dream of. It is the one that is.

Therefore we need to love the church as it is and not with conditions that it improve itself to justify our love. This is not to say that we love it without yearning for it to grow in grace and truth and that we don't seek to always reform it according to the Word of God. It is to say, that we strive to love as Christ loves as it is now, and not as we want it to be.

This can lead us to some difficult questions. Do you love your church? Do you love your church except a specific part? Or a specific person? Do you love your church, but are you concerned about the direction it is going? Do you love your church, as long as... or if only that doesn't happen...?

I believe that if we are to love the church as it is now and as Christ loves it, we cannot have qualifications on that love. Once again, that is not to say we turn a blind eye to interpersonal relationships that need healing or bad leadership that need directing, but it is to say that we unequivocally love because that is the way Jesus loves.



Let's take it a step further. What kind of family or spouse did Christ die for? What kind of country or government did Christ die for? What kind of neighborhood or neighbor did Christ die for? The answer is the same. Jesus died for the family and the spouse that we have, not the one we want. Jesus died for the country and governments that exist now, not the way we think they should be. Jesus died for the neighborhood that we live in and the neighbors that surround us, not the community that we wish we were in or the people we wish we were surrounded by.

While loving our church like this seems to be a natural demand, loving our neighborhood like this may be more of a challenge. It is in the church community that we gather in the name of Christ and in that gathering are implicitly reminded of Christ's sacrifice for us. We can easily lose a gracious mindset as we go out into our neighborhoods and live our day to day lives. What can you do to set Jesus' great sacrificial love before you as you live in your neighborhood and amongst your neighbors? How can you remind yourself that Jesus, out of great love, died for your neighbor as they are right now and not how you want them to be? How would that change the way that you live and love?

Why We Are Replacing the Rotation Model Children's Curriculum - by Tina Ritchie

Beginning this September the Christian Education Committee is excited to offer a new Jesus-centered curriculum for children preschool through high school, which will assist families in spiritual growth. Called the Gospel Project, these chronological, Christ-centered and age-appropriate Bible studies show how the whole Bible fits together, and promotes mission and gospel transformation, in lieu of behavior modification.



The following are factors we took into consideration on choosing to make this change:

Since the beginning of utilizing Christian education rotation model curriculum for children's ministry in 1998, our church has seen many changes in church participation and family dynamics.

- There were 5 classrooms on the same level as the sanctuary, in lieu of our 4 renovated classrooms downstairs under the sanctuary. After the remodel, simply moving the location of our classrooms has subconsciously and dramatically altered how our children's programs are perceived.
- The preschool and nursery rooms were larger and located on the lower level in the main hallway where most folks passed by on their way in and out of the building. There were 10 children in preschool and 15-20 babies in the nursery. Currently we have 3 active preschoolers and 3 babies in the nursery.
- There were 50-60 elementary children in the program on any given Sunday, which allowed us to have 5 different age groups. Currently we have 10 consistent children split into 2 groups.
- There was a great deal of excitement around classroom design and writing curriculum. Many parents and other interested adults were involved as teachers and shepherds, and youth were not needed, nor allowed, to shepherd. Today, we rely heavily on youth to shepherd and serve as mentors to younger children as many adults do not volunteer.

Why We Are Replacing the Rotation Model Children's Curriculum cont.

- Other social/cultural factors that have influenced changes in programming are the 2007-08 economic down turn where many families moved to secure jobs, the increase in participation of travel sports and competition dance, school sports schedules, increased academic pressure and high school Advance Placement classes, shared custody, and both parents working out of the home.

These factors have made it increasingly challenging to offer a quality Christian formation curriculum while maintaining excitement with our children, parents, and adult volunteers.

Today's families are pulled in many different directions and find it difficult to make space for Sunday morning, sometimes feeling guilty when they are able to come. A benefit of our program is that it appears stable, meaning that it has worked for many years and will continue to do so. This perception makes it comfortable for families to participate when they can as they do not have to be concerned about whether the children's program will be offered or not. This comfortability contributes to the sporadic attendance and disappointing adult volunteering.

Irregular participation hinders faith/spiritual formation from preschool through youth Bible study and Confirmation classes. While many of our youth come into youth group knowing stories about God and Jesus because of the rotation model, they do not have a clear understanding of how the Bible speaks into their life. And because many parents are not available to assist in the program, families are no longer sharing their faith learning to the extent they did in the past.

Important studies show that it is parents and grandparents who are the primary influence of faith formation in their children, not the church, a pastor or program. Thinking through these challenges had led myself, Sherry Rourke, and the CE committee to re-imagine what our children and youth programs could be. We desire to engage and equip families to share their faith with others. We desire to have programs that excite and entice life-long learning that point to who God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit are and how they work in our lives. Our faith is not merely an intellectual experience, but an active participation in growing and experiencing relationships with God/Jesus and others, including our children.

I ask you to consider how our previous children's programs have affected you, how you might be a part of our new faith formation vision, and how you can support and encourage families to take part. Specific information will follow in the coming months.




Children leave for class after the children's message during 10am worship.

The Lord's Prayer is a prayer presented by Jesus as a model prayer in response to the disciples' request that Jesus teach them how to pray. It also unites all Christians and embraces all forms of prayer including praise and acknowledgement of God's greatness, confession, thanksgiving and petition. When we pray, we are opening ourselves to God, stating what is in our hearts and listening to what God wants us to do. It is very personal and interactive; a person who recognizes that God is present in their life can actually communicate with the eternal God who wants to be active in that person's life.

The first part of the prayer affirms the relationship. We call on God as a loving parent. As we enter into prayer, we are reminded that we are entering holy space. Being human, we know that we are subject to temptation and the choice to walk a path that leads us away from God. We pray that God's kingdom will become a reality on earth. We ask that our daily needs be met. We ask for forgiveness, reminding ourselves that we must forgive. How wonderful is this eternal, omnipotent God!



Anytime we say this prayer, a particular phrase may seem to speak to us more than the others. The next time we pray, it may be a different phrase. As we say this prayer, we know that we are bonded in fellowship and grace with other believers all over the world. We live in a time, as always, when the world is divided on many issues and the Church is divided into many denominations. What a gift Jesus gave us to have a prayer that speaks to us and is one upon which we can all agree!
