Pastor's Article

Why People Leave Church

The American Church is in a general state of decline, with fewer than 20% regularly attending church. This suggests that 7.9 million people may be leaving churches annually. That's 150,000 each week! According to research conducted by LifeWay, the top two life-situations that prompt adults to stop attending church include being "too busy" (19%) and the burden of "family/ home responsibilities" (17%). The next most common category of reasons involves disenchantment with pastor/church; this accounts for 37% of the formerly churched.

6 Surprises About the De-Churched

- The de-churched are not mad at the Church. While many within the Church might view someone's departure as a sign that they're angry, that's not the case. Very few of the formerly churched expressed hostility toward the local body.
- Young adults return out of obedience to God. Almost half of those aged 18 to 35 cited this reason. Today's younger generation is sometimes viewed as rebellious or shunning God. While rebellion certainly applies to some, a large segment of young adults are returning for spiritual reasons.
- The de-churched don't feel awkward about coming back. Only 15% mentioned that they would feel awkward. So the Church shouldn't feel awkward about seeking out those who have left and asking them to return.
- Denominational preferences do not change among those who have left the Church. Fewer than 20% prefer to attend a church of a different denomination. Conversely, 64% of those who have left would prefer to attend a church of the same denomination. Clearly, denominational preference is not the impetus behind those who leave.
- The second visit is crucial among those returning to the church. Almost two-thirds of the de-churched maintained that they would like to remain anonymous until their second visit if they were to return. While our churches should remain amiable and open to all guests, perhaps we should focus on second and third-time guests as much as first-timers.
- Application of biblical teaching is important to those who return to the Church. Many within the dechurched camp affirmed that if they were to return, they'd seek a church that offered engaging and realistic dialogue about God and life. So the de-churched aren't concerned with ancillary items, but rather sound biblical teaching that applies to their lives. EXCERPTED from Outreach magazine, "Features," July/August 2007.

The Power of Invitation

Perhaps one of the most underestimated reasons people return to the Church is that someone simply invited them back. Overall, 41% of the formerly churched said that they would return to the local church if a friend or acquaintance invited them. Younger adults are even more influenced by the power of the invitation. Approximately 60% of those ages 18–35 would consider attending or returning to church if someone they knew asked them to come back. A simple, yet powerful invitation is all it may take to prompt a homecoming.



The Top Three Motivating Factors

While simply inviting a friend or letting him/her know they can personally make a difference are practical ways to bring people to the Church, two of the top three motivating factors for attending or returning to church are spiritual in nature. First, almost half of those who are considering attending Church said that they would do so because they feel it will bring them closer to God. Second, not only do people return to the Church because God is working in their hearts, but also because they sense a void in their lives. Over a third said that they would return to fill the emotional and spiritual gaps they've felt since leaving the Church the first time. The third motivating factor for those returning to Church is to be around those who hold similar values. Almost one-third said they'd want to attend a church in which people held the same moral standards as them.

"I Want to Make a Difference"

Almost a third of the formerly churched mentioned that if they were to return to church, they would want to be part of a local body where they could make a difference. By and large, people within the church feel more fulfilled in their lives when they sense that God is using them. And churches with high expectations of their members are actually more likely to draw people back into the fold. People want to serve and know that they are contributing to something significant. Making new members aware that the bar is set high for their contribution does not deter them, but rather motivates them to be a part of the local church.

Welcome Back

Back to Church Sunday began in 2009 in response to a survey that indicated 82% of people said they would attend church if someone they knew invited them. But only 2% of church members were inviting people to come with them to their church. Participating churches saw their attendance increase 31% on Back to Church Sunday. And 84% of the churches said this outreach even motivated their members to invit people to come to church.



When you feel good about what your church is doing, you're reinvigorated and encouraged to invited people to church. I want to encourage you to share the welcome that someone extended to you when you first came to FFPC. Invite someone to "come and see" for themselves where God is active and alive.

Come Back to Church With Us!

I often run into people who, upon finding out that I am a minister, inform me that they've been away from church for some time. Many aren't angry with the Church (though some are and often have good reasons for being so!), rather they've simply fallen out of practice. Many tell me that they'd really like to return but they're "afraid the roof will cave in."

It can be quite anxiety provoking to come back to church. Who knows what feelings this might stir up? The truth is that relief, not anxiety, is the central emotion that many people feel upon "coming home" to church.

But how does one "come home?" Do you need a formal invitation? Is there a need to announce one's absence and return? Here are three initial steps to take when you've made the decision to attend church again.

#1 Show Up: Start by calling up an old friend who attends church regularly or someone you used to sit next to. Before I became a pastor, many people I knew would tell me that they were looking to attend, but were too afraid to walk in on their own. I would always offer the invitation to attend with me. So ask around! Find someone you'd like to go to church with and then make a "church date" and attend with them.

#2 Reconciliation: After a long absence or hurt feelings, it can be a beautiful thing to experience reconciliation, be heard, forgive and move forward. Church people are not perfect, but through Christ we can walk forward together and become the community that Jesus is calling us to be.

#3 Re-Join: Find ways to re-enter the life of the church, such as trying out a Bible study class, joining a Coffee Hour team, serving the community during a Mission event, or helping as a Greeter. If you have been away for more than 1-2 years, you may not be an "Active" Member anymore, even though you are always a "member of the church" in your heart. If you're ready to step back into the life of the church, consider attending worship regularly, giving your tithe and offerings regularly, and express to the church leaders or pastors your desire to "re-join" or become "Active" again. Don't be afraid of committing--putting your name down might just help you resist the temptation to drift away again after a while.

Are you wanting to return to the practice of your faith, or thinking about it? As human beings, we all tend to wander for various reasons. We have lots of questions and doubts too. Wherever you are on your journey, we invite you to come home. The risen Jesus invites you to return home.

The truth is that coming back to church isn't as scary as it sounds. We would love to meet with you to welcome you back and help answer your questions. You are encouraged to email us to meet and talk to the pastors about returning to the practice of your faith.

Institute for Youth Ministry Grant Update

I sincerely hope that your summer season has been life giving, refreshing and full of the presence of God. As August approaches and vacations are winding down, our minds turn towards returning to school and watching for a change of weather.

At FFPC, summer is great time to reflect and gear up for the fall. After 2 years of discussion with our pastors, we have begun to look at the ways we engage in Youth and Young Adult Ministry, and how it has changed over the last few decades. Consider some of these challenges of doing ministry in a post-modern, post-Christian world: busyness of families and youth, non-traditional family structures, lower rates of Christian affiliation, plummeting church attendance, rate of cultural change and saturation of technology in our lives.

Questions to Ask Ourselves?

What if young people who graduated high school, remained strong in their faith and church-life after graduation and college?

What if Youth Ministry was more than Youth Group?

What if churches built Youth Ministry not just for young people, but with young people?

What if Youth Ministry became a construction site: a place where young and old work together to survey, build and reflect the Kingdom of God in their local community?

1st Step: Apply to Become One of 50 "Communities of Engagement"

Princeton Theological Seminary's Institute for Youth Ministry is engaging Christian congregations in an innovative initiative to help design, test, and implement new models of youth ministry. FFPC's Pastors and Staff applied to be one of the congregations to receive training and consultation.

2nd Step: We've Been Chosen as a "Community of Engagement"

FFPC was chosen as one of 50 Congregations nationwide. FFPC was chosen to receive an interactive curriculum designed to kick-start the development process of new forms of youth ministry. This process helped us to gain a snapshot of what we've done and what we're doing now in Youth and Young Adult Ministry. We also briefly began to imagine what we might do in the future to reach the next generation of youth.

3rd Step: Waiting to See if We've Been Chosen as a "Community of Practice"

In August, we'll hear if FFPC has been chosen for the next step of the process and if we'll become one of 12 churches selected to continue digging deeper into theology, design-thinking and biblical foundations for innovation in Youth Ministry. Even if we're not selected, we'll still benefit from the learning that the other church's will share with us!

2018 Bastille Day Race On Saturday, July 14, 2018, our church supported the Bastille Day Race in downtown Fenton. This year the race generated \$23,750 for the Genesee County Habitat for Humanity chapter and brought thousands of visitors into Fenton. The 15k race began at 7:45 am while the 5k run/walk began at 8:00 am. Both races were wrapping up by 10:00 am. Food and entertainment were available behind city hall where the race results were also posted.

Our church supplied 9 volunteers who assisted with traffic control at 6 neighborhood corners, plus 5 participants in the race. Thank you to the volunteers for assisting in this worthwhile cause. Everyone had a great time!









2018 Read and Feed Report

We are happy to report that our Read & Feed program was a great success for our seventh year! We registered 19 second and third grade readers from area elementary schools who had been identified as needing assistance with reading. We hoped to "jump-start" their fall schooling by providing them with four mornings of reading experiences as well as food for breakfast and lunch.

We used most of our church to have the students read to us or to trained dogs, to have us read to them, to play word games, to sing songs and play games using music, to create various arts and craft projects, and to have lots of fun! We used our new kitchen to serve them breakfast and lunch the days they were here. We sent food home for them and their siblings for the next several days. We also sent them home with books that were contributed by the congregation.

Parents were overwhelmingly positive about the program. All of the students were excited and enthused to participate. The reading specialists at the various elementary schools have indicated that we are making a positive difference!

We also want to thank the MANY volunteers from our church and St. Jude's who made this outreach possible. Thank you to our congregation for their support of our mission budget that enables this type of outreach. We want to thank Jet's Pizza and Uncle Ray's Dairyland for contributing the food for our final lunch; It was a huge hit with the students!

Bible Study

Sunday Morning Educational Hour: CASKET EMPTY September 16 – November 18 from 10-10:45am in Fellowship Hall. Have you ever thought that the Old Testment section of the Bible is a confusing collection of stories, poems and ancient documents? Have you ever thought that Scripture could be made more understandable by thinking of it as one redemptive story told by God to us? Professor Carol Kaminiski uses the acronym CASKET to describe the thematic thread throughout the Old Testament. Creation, Abraham, Sinai, Kings, Exile, and Temple describe the storyline making it easy to memorize, place key events and people in context and assist in fuller understanding of the Old Testament and New Testament alike. To further help with our learning an O.T. timeline will be available for purchase for \$10. Sign-ups will appear in the Fellowhsip Hall soon. Adults and youth are welcome to attend.

Verse Mapping Luke: Gathering the Goodness of God's Word by Kristy Cambron, September 19 – October 24 from 10am – noon in Fellowship Hall. Do you want to do more than just read Scripture? Do you want to research and apply what you learn to your life today? Verse mapping is a method of studying the historical context, transliteration, translation, connotation, and theological framework of a verse in the Bible. It's researching everything you can in a verse to learn more about who God is and how God wants to speak to you through the Word. Each session provides practical examples on how to take the first steps in verse mapping, learn how to explore the Bible like never before, and customize your Bible study time for a deeper and more authentic walk with God. Financial Peace University - Wednesdays 6:00pm-7:30pm. Do you use money? Do you need money? Does handling money God's way really work?

This class is for young professionals, newlyweds, those in debt, those not in debt yet wishing to have their money work better for them, and anyone who uses money. If you don't need this class, I guarantee that you know someone that does. It is an investment in your/their future financial security and, if followed, is the smartest investment you can make.

Coached by trained facilitator Tina Ritchie, in a fun video and discussion based format, learn how to:

- 1. Neutralize arguments
- 2. Delay consequences
- 3. Show empathy instead of sympathy see excerpt below
- 4. Share control
- 5. Set limits with enforceable statements
- 6. Guide kids and other people in your life to own and solve their own problems

Sympathy versus Empathy

Our hearts ache when we hear about children being hurt. Because we care, we hate the pain they have experienced and yearn to help them heal. This motivation is wonderful... as long as we also recognize that feeling sorry for kids isn't the same thing as loving them and empowering them to heal.

Sympathy is often demonstrated by "feeling sorry for" someone, and can lead us toward unintentionally sending the unstated message: "This is so horrible that you'll never be able to cope and find joy in your life." Sympathy can lead to continued despair and an expectation that someone else should "fix" our troubles, which then creates disconnection.

Empathy is "loving" someone by purposefully sending a very different unstated message: "I can't imagine how much this must hurt. I'm so sorry this happened to you. I'm here for you. I believe in you." Empathy creates connection while empowering the one who is hurting to find a way out of their situation.

Youth Group Updates

Montreat High School Youth Conference

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This year's conference theme, Lift Every Voice was inspired by hymn #563 "Lift Every Voice and Sing", in our Presbyterian Hymnal. This hymn's text and history reflect the support and courage that are still necessary today for those of us who follow Jesus and love our neighbors.

The conference goal for this summer was to strive to be a place where authenticity, community, connection, and God's truth thrive. It sought to be an inclusive place where each voice can be heard and where each heart can be molded; where change is invited, challenged is expected, and where all are embraced.

Six youth and three adults experienced all of this and more during our week together. 2 of our youth were accepted into the Jeremiah Project which assisted with keynote and worship leadership. We had 6 days of worship and small groups, along with 5 days of keynote and recreation events that spoke to the day's themes. On our free day we ventured up Grey Beard mountain for hiking, and frolicked in the stream finding swimming holes and waterfalls. Friday afternoon we encouraged one another up Lookout Mountain's summit. Friday night worship consisted of communion and the 1000 participants joining in candlelight around Lake Susan. Below are discussion themes. We hope you enjoy the pictures, and you ask us about our trip!

Theme 1: God's Voice explored being free in God's love to love ourselves and free ourselves from being defined in a category, thus fully living into our gifts from God.

Scripture references: Luke 4:16-30 and Ezekiel 37

Question of the day: How might your life be different if you lived in God's freedom?

Theme 2: Difficult Voices explored our internal reactions that affirm self over others. Challenged to think about whether or not we are good listeners, we discussed the spiritual practices of empathy and discernment through "Ruah" - the life-giving and soul satisfying Spirit of God.

Scripture references: Luke 23:13-21 and Jeremiah 7:1-15 Question of the day: Where is "Ruah" missing in your life?

Theme 3: Our Voices challenged us to find what we are passionate about, and explored how we can nurture and express our voices. We learned that being in community is important because we find truth tellers and share accountability. Voice is less about volume and more about truth. Where there is truth, there is Gospel.

Scripture references: Numbers 27:1-5 and Matthew 15:21-28 **Question of the day:** What prompts you to get up and speak up?

Theme 4: Silenced Voices explored listening to the unheard voices that need to be lifted up. "Preach the gospel at all times; use words when necessary," and ask how we can best support another in lieu of telling them what they need. We were asked to think about the last time we showed up for another, and the last time another showed up for us.

Scripture references: Proverbs 31:8-9 and Mark 2:1-12

Thought of the day: The best way to find yourself is in the service of others. – Ghandi

Theme 5: United Voices explored the philosophy of Ubuntu – "I am, because of you" – in which we value the success of the group over the individual. In Ubuntu we find our soul identity – our Imago Dei – affirming humanity when we acknowledge it in others. We each are an expression of God, co-creators with God when we act in God's image, and we are all family.

Scripture references: Psalm 150 and 1 Corinthians 12: 12-31

Questions of the day: Why is unity so difficult? What is your vision for a better tomorrow? What is your role?




New this fall in youth group, we will be studying the Gospel Project curriculum.

Children's Ministry For Children Preschool – 5th Grade




Children kindergarten – 5th grade are learning about The Lord's Prayer. August lesson highlights are below:

Aug 6: <u>Puppetry</u> explores the phrase "Lead us not into temptation..." The Lord's Prayer can give us guidance as we face the temptations and difficult situations that are around us each day. Children will create brief skits about tempting situations.

Head Up, Phone Down When Headed Back to School

According to a study by SafeKids.org, 61 children are hit by cars every day in the United States, most often during the hours before and after school, and peaking in September.

The National Safety Council is focused on efforts to eliminate distracted walking – specifically walking while texting. According to a study by The Nielsen Company, kids age 13 to 17 send more than 3,400 texts a month. That's seven messages every hour they are awake.

Before your children head out, remind them of these year-round safety tips:

- 1. Never walk while texting or talking on the phone
- 2. If texting, move out of the way of others and stop on the sidewalk
- 3. Never cross the street while using an electronic device
- 4. Do not walk with headphones on
- 5. Be aware of the surroundings
- 6. Always walk on the sidewalk if one is available; if a child must walk on the street, he or she should face oncoming traffic
- 7. Look left, right, then left again before crossing the street
- 8. Cross only at crosswalks


