GOD HAS BOUNDARIES BY PASTOR ROBBIE CARNES

Some of you may be familiar with the book 'Boundaries' by Drs. Cloud and Townsend. Published in 1992, this book describes healthy boundaries as a way to avoid manipulation and other controlling behavior from others, and as a way of refraining from engaging in those same behaviors toward others. Using techniques and language akin to Love and Logic and Alcoholics Anonymous the book has a lot to say about growing in genuine relationship with each other by reflecting carefully about how we act toward and react to the people in our lives.

Did you know that God has boundaries? These are not physical boundaries, but relational ones. God's boundaries with us teach us how to have good boundaries with each other.

God leaves us work to do that only we can do. When it comes to personal growth and transformation we are the only ones who can do the work. 2 Peter 3:9 and Ezekiel 18:23 speak of a God who

does not relish in destruction and is patient with us so that all might live. However, God allows us to experience the sometimes painful consequences of our actions so that we might learn from them. God allows for us to feel pain from our choices so that we might change our behavior. He does not rescue us from ourselves.

God respects our no. Real love is freely given and freely received. Therefore God freely loves and freely allows for us to reject him. This is a most beautiful and tragic thing. Think of the Rich Young Ruler in Matthew 19. Jesus loved him, but he accepted the young man's no. God will not control us. God respects our boundaries.

God listens to our prayers. Yet God is not rigid. Prayer is a profound moment in which we converse with the maker of the universe and God listens. God's boundaries are not impenetrable walls. Through prayer we are invited in.

God accepts our anger. Have you ever been angry at God? What would you say if I told you that God can accept your anger? God's boundaries are such that our anger doesn't scare him or shut him down. God's boundaries can take our anger and transforms it with love. Because God has healthy boundaries we can feel safe to have authentic conversations with him and develop healthy boundaries of our own.

God takes responsibility for himself. God does not blame his problems nor his pain on others. God seeks to enact change instead of applying guilt. We find this in the parable of the King's Banquet (Matt 22:1-14). The king invites guests to a banquet and they all reject the invitation. Taking responsibility for the situation, he says to his servants to find other quests from the street corners. 'He takes responsibility for the pain and makes moves to make his life different. He lets go of the rejecting people and reaches out to some new friends' (Boundaries, pg. 241).

God is free from us. God cannot be manipulated or guilted into anything. Therefore we cannot engage in manipulating behavior and seek to control God. In C.S. Lewis' book, The Great Divorce, there

is a scene in which a mother takes the bus to heaven. She is invited to explore heaven and be with her son whom she dearly loves and desperately misses. She refuses and demands that her son be brought to her because she loves her son and she is his mother. This of course cannot be because Heaven is a place in which you can enter and be transformed by love, but isn't a place you can easily leave, because of that transformation. Her manipulation of God a failure, she refuses the invitation to enter heaven and departs for hell, bitter and without her son.

God is a God of relational boundaries and calls us to develop our own boundaries in our relationships with others. During our worship services in the month of November we will be preaching about God's boundaries and the need to address our own boundaries. If you desire to read the book 'Boundaries', please look for a copy in the church library.



2018 CROP WALK

Over 140 people from the Fenton churches showed up to walk in the 2018 CROP Walk on October 7 including 42 people from our church. We think this is a record number of walkers from our church! The contest between St. Jude's and FFPC increased participation and interest! Since we "won", Pastor Robbie was a good sport and shaved his beard off!! Because St. Jude's participation was also up, Pastor Tracy still dyed her hair green.

This was Fenton's 38th annual walk for the Fenton, Lake Fenton, Linden and Holly area. Walkers proceeded past various stations within Bush Park designed to raise hunger awareness, as well as around downtown Fenton. Alternately, participants could sit and rock at one location or could do Jazzercise at another.

Approximately \$14,000 is raised each year through this walk to "end hunger one step at a time." One-fourth of the money raised this year will be used to support three local agencies: FISH (Food Pantry) in Linden, St. Jude's School Lunch Program and Fenton UMC Food Bank.

THE 2 RULES OF LOVE 7 LOGIC

Rule #1: Adults set firm limits in loving ways without anger, lectures, threats, or repeated warnings. **Rule #2:** When children misbehave and cause problems, adults hand these problems back in loving ways.

These rules apply to ALL relationships. It's a matter of acknowledging and dealing with your own feelings first so that you can then set boundaries with empathy. Boundaries are limits that YOU can live with; they are NOT to be forced on the other. Said another way, you take care of yourself first by setting limits, and then lovingly hand problems back to those whom they belong. This preserves your relationships and allows others to grow from the experience. Isn't this what God does for us, too?

FINANCIAL PEACE CORNER 7 CHARACTERISTICS OF DEBT FREE LIVING

Family #1 manages to pay off \$40,000 in debt in two years on a \$35,000 annual income. Family #2 makes \$100,000 a year but can't seem to make the slightest dent in the same amount of debt. One of these families is on their way to be-



coming debt-free. The other is making the same mistakes they have been for years. Why is that?

While many factors could be in play here, one of the most likely reasons is the second family has created a habit of overspending. They earn a great income, but they probably spend beyond their budget, which leaves them with less money and causes a lot of tension around the house. That's a difficult and stressful way to live.

The people who overcome that stress realize they have to handle money differently and make some lifestyle changes. When they make those adjustments, they begin to establish certain characteristics that are super important when it comes to becoming debt-free and staying that way. As Dave always says, personal finance is 80 percent behavior and 20 percent head knowledge.

So, what are some of the behaviors of people who are becoming debt-free?

- 1. They are countercultural
- 2. They use self-control
- 3. They are confident
- 4. They are goal-driven
- 5. They are gazelle intense
- 6. They are not materialistic
- 7. They are willing to make sacrifices




LIBRARY NEWS





FAMILY CORNER



HOT MARSHMALLOWS VS. COOL IMAGINATION Written by J. Bradley Wigger

Maybe you've seen the videos demonstrating the marshmallow test. A young child is ushered into a room by an adult researcher who says something like: "Here's a marshmallow for you. If you wait until I come back, you can have two. Or you can eat it now, but you only get the one marshmallow." The researcher leaves and the torture begins. Child after child stares at the marshmallow. Some poke at it, others smell it. I've seen some even kiss the treat, as if

making friends will help reduce the temptation. Grimaces. Furrowed brows. You can see the agony as children try to resist eating the one now. Some succeed, others barely try and just go for it.

The research was originally conducted at Stanford by Walter Mischel in the 1960s, and his subsequent research found that the ability to wait for the second marshmallow in the preschool years was a strong predictor of academic success and self-control in adolescence and beyond. Two different thinking systems are competing: a hot one that responds immediately and a cooler one that can slow down the reaction, imagine consequences, and generate self-control. Mischel playfully suggests that if Adam and Eve had been able to cool down their hot temptations, they could have stayed in the garden longer.

The key to such cooling is, surprisingly, a vivid imagination. Specifically, the ability to imagine your future self.

The implication is that children who can clearly imagine a hoped-for future can potentially override the present hot temptation. And I'm drawn to the notion that patience is deeply tied to hope. The apostle Paul would agree:

For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. (Romans 8: 24-25) Patience here—the ability to wait, the resistance to impulse, the capacity to cool hot temptations—is the fruit of hope. And hope is not possible without a powerful imagination, the ability to envision what we do not see.

I have been studying children's imaginations for many years now and contrary to theories about the concreteness of their thinking, I have found that most kids have no problem imagining the unseen. From invisible friends and germs, to love and God, they frequently have vivid imaginations for the unseen in ways that are often harder for adults.

My hunch is that the most powerful form of imagination happens when we imagine together, when we share vision. If that shared vision includes the unseen source of grace, includes a vision of a God who loves us no matter what, I can only imagine the hope generated. And maybe too, an extra portion of patience, with one another, with ourselves.


