### COMING HOME FOR CHRISTMAS By Pastor Robbie Carnes

**Are you going home for the holidays?** With Thanksgiving past and Christmas coming our thoughts dwell on memory making and spending time with family. For some this is joyful, for many it is hectic. For others it is heart wrenching. For all of us, for better or for worse, it is home.

#### Home is where we belong

Home is where we are known and have an identity. Have you considered that our church is a home in which each of us is given an identity? We all have the same heavenly parent and are created in God's image, so all of us are brothers and sisters. As Christians, even if we don't know each other's given name, we know who we are as children of God and we know how to treat God's own.



We also belong at home. Christ died for the church and his life sustains the church. There is no time in our lives that we don't fit. We need young people to love, educate and to challenge us. We need middle-aged people to serve, build and plant us. We need older people to give wisdom, restraint and patience. We need married people, single, widowed and divorced. We need people who have it all together and people who are strung out. We need people who look like us and people who do not. All of us belong here because with all of us we can better understand who God is calling us to be and even who God is.

We also have a place at home. In a household everyone has their chores and tasks that they are best suited to accomplish—from feeding the family pets to cleaning the gutters. In our church-home, the Holy Spirit equips us for various tasks according to who we are and the seasons of our lives. We give and take, lead and follow, as the Spirit calls. Whether we are leading or listening, we all have a valuable place and we all have an ear for what the Spirit might call us to next. This allows us to encourage each other in faith and treat each other with mutual forbearance. In a home where we all have a place there is no need to jockey for position. We can rest in the fact that we are who God has made us and we are all doing what Jesus is asking in the power of the Holy Spirit.

#### Jesus makes the earth home

The marvel of Christmas is that Jesus makes the earth his home. Being born in a manger, the King of Heaven comes as a child to claim us as children and heirs of the Kingdom of Heaven. Whether we are born in a manger or in a palace, we are claimed by our Heavenly Father and it is that fact that defines us and gives us our ultimate identity.

Jesus, belonging to Heaven and claiming earth as his own, establishes in us a heavenly belonging that transforms our earthly one. There is nowhere we can go that we do not belong because we are sent. This is true of us as individuals and especially true of the church. As envoys of the Heavenly King, we have purpose no matter where we find ourselves. From the manger to the fields by night our belonging is in heaven and our mission is on earth.

Jesus made his home in a manger and through his life, death and resurrection we know that in the same way the Holy Spirit makes a home in us. If the Spirit dwells in our hearts then we can know that our true dwelling doesn't depend on our circumstance. Finding a true place to be comes from the interior work that the Holy Spirit does in us. Becoming centered through the Holy Spirit allows us to live with a balanced sense of place no matter what changes we might go through.

Having an identity, a sense of belonging and a place to be, all boils down to knowing that we are loved. When we come to terms with the fact that in Jesus' birth and in his death God loves us, we find that the deep yearnings of identity, belonging and place are all met. No longer do we need to strive for place or position. No longer do we need to carve out a name for ourselves. No longer do we need to push others away so that we might have space. We can simply enjoy the gift of love.

Jesus came to earth, as a baby in a manger with family around him, to claim the church as home, were our yearnings are met. We yearn for love and we find it in Christ. May your Christmas Season be filled with love, and may you and your family and our church find ways to love each other and the world through that love.

### MISSION UPDATE.....

#### FPPC RESPONDS TO REFUGEE IN NEED.

The following is an email excerpt from Elder Sarah Martin-Fanone. Having been trained by Samaritas (A refugee resettlement program) she has had the opportunity to extend the love of Christ to a man from the Democratic Republic of Congo, Rolly who has been resettled in Michigan.

"Rolly is a refugee, this is a legal status granted by the UN. What it means is that he has had to flee his home country, and he has no hope of a safe return. Refugees, by definition are working towards gaining citizenship in a new country. They do not get to choose the new country; it is assigned to them after and if they pass through more than a dozen official processes/checks/etc. This process of checks can take years. Once a refugee is granted asylum and assigned to a country, then they are assigned to an agency that is contracted by the government to resettle them in their new home. In this case, Rolly has spent the last eight years living outside of his

home, the Democratic Republic of Congo. Samaritas is the agency that our government has assigned to his case. They are contracted to help him and will work with him to get his paperwork rolling. They are not given enough resources to help him indefinitely or even until he gains citizenship."

At the time of this email Rolly had been in Michigan for almost 3 weeks.

"He is feeling more comfortable in his apartment and has met some of his neighbors. I was able to spend the morning with him today, and thanks to the generosity of our congregation, I delivered an assortment of office supplies, clothing, groceries, cleaning supplies, and a Visa gift card."

"Finding employment is imperative for anyone who is newly settled. Rolly's first job opportunity at a hotel did not materialize. However, he is actively looking for a job and is open to anything! (In the DRC he earned his master's degree in economics and he worked in a bank.) There is a [Samaritas] volunteer who is going to take him to fill out applications at stores in his neighborhood tomorrow afternoon. He is ready to work!"

"His English is rapidly improving. We were able to communicate much faster today."

"There is a PC (USA) church, Park United, just down the street from his apartment. I have been in contact with one of their leaders and they are ready to welcome him. Today we drove there to help familiarize him with the location. He is very excited to resume attending church."

"We also spent some time today learning the DDOT bus system. The bus can take him to and from church, among other places, and will hopefully open some doors! He has a one month bus pass to start him off."

"Finally, Rolly shared today that he is concerned about his sons, ages 10 and 3. Since he has left home, there has been no way to pay for their school fees. Primary school in Malawi is not free, and until he can send money the boys will have to stay home. If anyone knows

of a group that might be able to sponsor these boys, please let me know. Their combined school fees equal about \$375 US for the year."

# FOOD BANK OF EASTERN MICHGAN NOVEMBER 17, 2018

On November 17, 20 volunteers from our church spent the morning sorting food for distribution to the partner agencies. We sorted 5642 pounds of food that will create 188,550 meals for families. The Mission Committee wants to thank our members for their numerous methods of supporting the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan!

The Food Bank of Eastern Michigan helps provide food to the hungry in 22 counties in the eastern half of Michigan. Over 19% of the people in eastern Michigan are food insecure. There are 400 partner agencies in 22 counties that work daily to make a difference. 98% of the money raised goes toward services.

Through your pledges to our church's program, the Mission Committee makes donations to the Food Bank. In addition, our members have supported their Empty Bowls fundraiser in September as well as volunteering our hands to assist them in sorting food for distribution.





Coached by trained facilitator, Tina Ritchie, in an engaging video & discussion based format, participants will learn the 2 rules of Love and Logic:

- 1. Adults set firm limits in loving ways without anger, lectures, threats, or repeated warnings.
- 2. When children (or others) misbehave and cause problems, adults hand these problems back in loving ways.

It takes a great amount of love to set limits and allow others to experience the consequences of their poor decisions. When we do this, others learn the following logic: "Every choice I make has consequences. Life is better when I make good ones!"

## HOLIDAY HELP FROM OUR I JBRARY

### THINKING ABOUT ENABLING AS PART OF OUR "IMPERFECT DNA" LESSONS FROM BOUNDARIES AND LOVE AND LOGIC:

Dr. Hendy Cloud, co-author of the Boundaries books states, "Codependency is one of the deepest, almost pathologically archetypal behavior patterns in the human race. It is as though we are "enabling" as a species. It seems it goes that deep into our imperfect DNA, and rampant in business.

Actually, "imperfect DNA" is a good way of looking at this one, as it is a form of caring gone awry. People enable others because they care. But this kind of caring is not caring at all and is destructive to the person being helped. It is a toxic dependency. It keeps adult kids dependent on parents long after they should have been independent adults. It keeps addicted spouses and friends addicted long after they should have been allowed to hit bottom and wake up.

So make this distinction in your mind firmly: There is a difference between helping someone who is disabled, incapable or otherwise infirm, versus helping someone who is resisting growing up and taking care of what every adult has to be responsible for: herself or himself. When you find yourself in any way paying for someone else's responsibilities, not only are you stuck with a delayed ending, but you are probably harming that person."

Start to live your live without codependent habits, and give your kids, spouses, friends, and co-workers the gift of owning and solving their own problems.

#### Does practicing boundaries sound like Love and Logic? Yes!

#### Want to learn more on how to do this?

Check out a "Boundaries" book or one of the 28 books on various "Love and Logic" topics and techniques. Additionally, there are 5 DVD's and 24 CD's on Love and Logic topics that range from "Keeping Cool When Parenting Heats Up" to "Hope for Underachieving Kids" to how to help those with behavioral or physical disabilities. A complete list of topics can be found in our library, however all media resources must be checked out through the office. All books can be checked out through the library or resource cart. You might also consider taking a Love and Logic course to help you process and practice more successful relationship techniques.



Have you seen the new CareNotes booklets for teens, kids, and their families located outside the office? CareNotes provide a wealth of emotional, recovery, health, and grief support and information, addressing real-life emotional, psychological and spiritual needs. You can find information on topics like anxiety, anger, addiction, bullying, self-esteem, divorce, death, illness, and relationship

issues. They are concise and easy-to-read, providing guidance, help, and healing for those who are hurting; a thorough resource guide is supplied. Let the office know if there is a topic you are interested in and do not see it in the rack. The Christian Education Committee can look for this topic in the next order.



# FINANCIAL PEACE CORNER A QUICK GUIDE TO YOUR EMERGENCY FUND BY RACHEL CRUZE

Wouldn't it feel great to have a buffer between you and the curveballs life throws at you—a cushion that helps you sleep soundly because it turns a major life crisis into just a slight inconvenience? Even if your AC goes on the fritz in mid-July, you're cool as can be. Why? Because you had your safety net in place!

And that little safety net is an essential part of the 7 Baby Steps. Say hello to the fully funded emergency fund, also known as Baby Step 3.

#### What is an emergency fund?

An emergency fund is simply money you've set aside for life's unexpected events. We're talking about true emergencies here, like a car wreck, a hospital visit or a leaky roof. Suddenly seeing that flat-screen television go on clearance or walking past a BOGO shoe sale doesn't qualify as an emergency. Sorry, you guys!

If you have debt, I recommend saving a starter emergency fund of \$1,000 first. Then, once you're out of debt, it's time to beef up those savings and build a fully funded emergency fund of three to six months of expenses.

The reason to have an emergency fund is simple: You don't know what's going to happen. And no one wants to live at the mercy of life's twists and turns. Your emergency fund will come in handy if you suddenly lose your job or your HVAC breaks in the dead of winter. Don't let yourself be caught off guard! You need that safety net between you and life. Believe me . . .

When my husband, Winston, and I were newlyweds—we're talking 30 days into marriage—I backed into a car in the post office parking lot. Was it just a little fender bender? Oh, no . . . the other car's door was bent in the opposite direction and I felt terrible. The good news was, no one was hurt and we had insurance. The bad news was, our deductible was \$1,000—and that was a lot of money for us. Thankfully, we had our starter emergency fund there to pull from, but if we hadn't, a bad situation could have become much, much worse.

#### How big should my emergency fund be?

The more stable your income and household are, the less you need in your emergency fund.

If you're part of a two-income household or you've had a steady job for several years, then a three-month emergency fund is probably just fine. But if you're a one-income family, you're self-employed, or you earn straight commission, then a six-month emergency fund is probably a better idea for you since a job loss could make you unable to pay the bills.

You should also aim for a six-month fund if someone in your house has a chronic medical condition that requires frequent visits to the doctor or hospital. Even if there's room in your monthly budget to pay for the expenses, it's good to be prepared in case a big emergency hits.

Where should I keep my emergency savings?

Your emergency fund should be liquid, meaning you need to keep it in a place where you can get to it easily and quickly. The best option is a simple checking account or money market account that comes with a debit card or check-writing privileges. That way, you can pay that doctor or mechanic quickly and with no headaches.

But make sure you're not keeping your emergency fund in a place that's too easy to access. You don't want to be tempted to dip into it! Winston and I keep ours at a completely different bank than our other accounts to make sure it's as far away as possible!

#### When should I use my emergency fund?

When a sudden expense pops up, it can feel like an emergency—but that might not be true. Here are three questions to ask yourself to determine if you need to tap into your emergency savings:

- 1. Is it unexpected?
- 2. Is it necessary?
- 3. Is it urgent?

The more you answer yes, the more likely that situation you're in is an emergency and justifies using money from your emergency fund.

#### How to Build an Emergency Fund

#### 1. Make a budget and live by it.

List all your monthly income and any expenses. When you're making your budget, you'll be able to see how much money you have available to put toward your savings goal. This will help you as you get ready to jump into the next step.

#### 2. Set a monthly savings goal.

This is how much you want to set aside each month to continue building up your emergency fund. I know, taking money from your paycheck and putting it away to save for the future can be really hard. But you'll be surprised at how quickly your savings can grow if you're consistent about adding to it! Don't know how much is the right amount? Go back to step one and work that budget.

#### 3. Adjust how much you save.

As time goes by, you might be able to save even more! If you or your spouse get a promotion at work, that means you can add more cash to your savings! Be sure to look over your budget for new ways to tighten the purse strings and up the amount you're saving.

#### Quick Ways to Save \$1,000

One of the easiest ways to beef up your emergency fund is to sell some stuff! Go take a look in your garage or dig through your closet—is there anything you could part with? Selling some items that are collecting dust can add up to major cash in your emergency savings. And every little bit helps! You'd be surprised at how quickly \$5 here or \$10 there can add up. Plus, you're doing some decluttering at the same time. Win-win!

And let's not forget about that wonderful four-letter word: work. Take on a part-time job. Start a side business. Look into dog walking in the mornings before your day job or babysitting those cute kids next door every other weekend. It's little things like this that can really help you stack extra cash fast!

Another great way to find extra cash? Take my 14-Day Money Finder Challenge! You might be pleasantly surprised at how much cash you can find when you take a closer look at your lifestyle. The average person ends up finding \$2,000 for the year—so go take the challenge and see how much extra cash you can find!

#### **Start Your Emergency Fund Today!**

Take a second and dream with me—can you imagine what it would feel like to have no debt payments and have six months' worth of expenses saved in the bank sitting pretty in your emergency fund? Seriously, stop and think about what life would feel like. You'd be able to breathe easier with that safety net in place, wouldn't you? An emergency fund is sort of like insurance—it costs you some money upfront, but it covers you when things go bad.

Now that you have that picture in your mind, start putting your emergency fund in place! Get on a budget, pay off your debt, and begin saving. You'll be amazed at how quickly your emergency fund piles up when you aren't making debt payments! But the best part? You'll feel an amazing sense of security after completing Baby Step 3.

In fact, if the roof leaks or the washer breaks, don't be shocked if you end up thinking, Eh, what's the big emergency anyway? That's the peace of mind that comes with completing your emergency fund! It turns what would have been a major emergency into just a little inconvenience.
