

Pastor's Article

The Dew of Hermon

We can thank the Hallmark company for associating the month of February with Love. It is the time for chocolates and cards and focus on romantic love. Certainly love is something that Christians should be greatly concerned about. However romance might not be the quality of love that best describes the Gospel to our world today. As the song goes: what the world needs now is love, sweet love. It's the only thing we have too little of. We know from 1 John 3:16 "We have come to know love by this: that Jesus laid down his life for us; thus we ought to lay down our lives for our fellow Christians." In order to love fully we must serve each other sacrificially. What better way for the Church to express love than through unity in Christ?

Psalm 133, traditionally sung as Israelites traveled to Jerusalem for annual festivals, provides us a wonderful analogy of unity.

- 133:1 Look! How good and how pleasant it is when brothers truly live in unity!
- 133:2 It is like fine oil poured on the head which flows down the beard Aaron's beard, and then flows down his garments.
- 133:3 It is like the dew of Hermon, which flows down upon the hills of Zion. Indeed, that is where the LORD has decreed a blessing will be available eternal life.

I am struck with the poetic comparison of two major biblical mountains: Hermon and Zion. Mount Hermon, at 9232 feet, can have snow on its summit year round. The snowpack provides year round irrigation for the surrounding area as it gradually melts in the warmer seasons. It supports a variety of plant life including pine, oak and popular trees and even vineyards, providing water for the Sea of Galilee, and ultimately the Dead Sea to the south. It is on Mount Hermon that Jesus was transfigured before three of his disciples in Matthew 17.




Compare this with Mount Zion. 175 miles to the south and in the capitol city of ancient Israel, Zion is much shorter at 2510 feet and gets 10-20 inches less rain a year than Hermon. The position of each mountain in their respective ranges provides significantly different opportunities to collect moisture coming off the Mediterranean Ocean. Today Mount Hermon has ski resorts and is to some degree open space. Mount Zion, hosts the city of Jerusalem which is bustling, full of people, conflict and division. Growing up in San Diego, California I can remember two weeks in the Spring that was green and lush and the rest of the year was brown and brittle. What a delight it was, in the heat of summer, to leave the busy city and travel into the coastal mountains and find cool creeks, lush meadows and peaceful woods.

This is the imagery that the psalmist is capturing by comparing these two mountains. Sacrificial love that is shared among people committed to the Lord is like an oasis in a dry land. It is the twinkling song of a spring in the desert. It is the first buds of Spring. All at once refreshing and unexpected. It is restful for the soul.

Unity isn't easy. However, it is in simply gathering together in the name of Christ that we witness and proclaim the Gospel. For what other thing could bring people like us together? We are wealthy and poor. We are parents and singles. We are married and widowed. We are young and old. We have different interests, body shapes, politics and preferences. What else could possibly call us together but the Holy Spirit?

Our unity in Christ primarily accomplishes two things. First, we testify to the reality of God by gathering together. Secondly, we express the Gospel of Love by the way we gather in Christ's name. In John 15:12-14 Jesus says, "My commandment is this – to love one another just as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this – that one lays down his life for his friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you." Let us be a Church that is known for its unity and its love for each other. A shared love that is sacrificial, refreshing and renewing. A love that is carries each other's burdens and admonishes each other into greater knowledge of truth, mercy and justice. A love that is so evident that our community cannot help but recognize it and be refreshed themselves.

For the last 2 years church communication needed special attention, so a separate Communications Committee was formed to work on our publicity, website, social media and church communications.


Now we feel that it is time to pull these two committees back together and refocus our our 2019 goals as the Member & Communications Committee.





Financial Peace Corner

Dave's Advice on Tithing & Giving: Your 5 Questions Answered.

As the old saying goes: We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give.

Three big principles of any solid financial plan are to save, spend and give. Most people forget about the giving part, though, because they think mostly about saving and spending.

But giving—specifically tithing—is just as important. It softens the heart of the giver and frees their soul from dependence on money. You'll never walk away from giving feeling bad! Giving comes in many forms, with your tithe being the most important, because it's a biblical mandate.

What is a tithe?

Let's start with the basics. Simply put, the tithe is the first 10% of your income that should be given to your local church. It's strictly measured in money, so you can't replace it with giving your time or your talents.

What does the Bible say about tithing?

According to Leviticus 27:30 (TLB), "A tenth of the produce of the land, whether grain or fruit, is the Lord's, and is holy." And 2 Corinthians 9:7 (NIV) says, "Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."



What's the difference between tithing and offerings?

A tithe is an amount (a percentage of your income) and an offering is anything given beyond that, but not in place of the tithe.

After you've tithed, you can give in other ways: Giving a cash offering to your church above and beyond the tithe, giving money to a charity you support, giving to a friend or neighbor in need, or giving of your time or talents. Not only does giving of your money or other resources generate good in the lives of others, it also generates contentment in your heart.

Why should I tithe?

The tithe was not put into place for God's benefit—He already has everything He needs. He doesn't need our money! (And "our" money is already His anyway.)

Tithing is an act of obedience and should be given freely with pure motives. In other words, we give without expecting anything back in return. And it teaches us to be good stewards of what God has given us.

Tithing was created for our benefit. It teaches us how to keep God first in our lives and how to live unselfishly. Unselfish people make better spouses, friends, relatives, employees and employers. And they usually have better finances. God is trying to teach us how to prosper over time.

Remember, no one has ever become poor by giving. But what about those times when you're wondering if your situation is the exception?

- Is it okay to pause my tithing during tough financial times?
- Is it okay to claim a tax deduction for your tithe?
- I'm not affiliated with a church—should I still give?
- Is it 10% of my income before or after taxes?
- Do you increase giving when you start making more money?

Other Common Questions About Tithing

1. Is it okay to pause my tithing during tough financial times?

The Bible doesn't mention anything about "pausing" tithing. And it doesn't say we'll go to hell if we don't tithe. But get this: Many people have observed that after they stopped tithing, their finances seemed to get worse. In Malachi 3:8–11, God says that if you tithe instead of keeping it for yourself, He will pour out blessing and rebuke your devourers. In other words, He'll keep you safe from those who might harm you. So keep tithing. If you can't live off 90% of your income, then you're probably struggling to live off 100% anyway, and that means you have bigger financial problems you need to address. It shouldn't require a miracle for you to get through the month with 10% less in your wallet. If you sit down and look at your budget, you'll see you can make it while giving away at least 10%. That might mean cutting some fun money or increasing your income, but it can be done. Read the Bible and take from it what you will, but remember this: If you tithe, do it out of love for God, not out of guilt.



2. Is it right to count my church tithe on my tax returns?

You were biblically obedient by giving your tithe to your church. The Bible tells us to be good managers of our money, but it doesn't shrink the value of your gift if you take the tax deduction. It is a way to manage the other 90% of your money. Take the deduction. Later, when you get your income tax refund, remember it's money you've already tithed—although you're certainly welcome to devote some or all of it back to the Lord as additional thanks for His blessings.

- 3. If I'm not affiliated with a church, should I still donate 10% of my income? If you don't belong to a church, you can still give a percentage of your income to charities and philanthropies that are important to you. Think of what causes matter most to you, and align your support there. There are plenty of ministries and organizations that are doing great work and could benefit from a percentage of your income.
- 4. Do I donate 10% of my income before or after taxes? Do I factor in income from side hustles? Honestly, whether you tithe from your gross pay or your take-home pay is entirely up to you. The point here is you're giving that 10% of your income. Dave gives off the top of his taxable income, but he'll be the first to tell you, "Just give and be a giver. It's about changing your spirit anyway." As for your side hustle—the 10% should be a percentage of your entire amount of income. So if you take a part-time job on the weekends that brings in \$300 extra each month, add that amount to your total monthly income.



5. I'm making more money now. I want to know

how to increase giving above the tithe.

When things are going well and you find yourself with lots more income than you need, it can be easy to accidentally spend all that extra cash on yourself. But it should be a great opportunity to begin thinking about other ways to give above and beyond your tithe. That's why it's a good idea to budget what you'll do with the extra so you can make sure you're giving some of it too.

Once you've calculated your tithe, plus any saving and spending you're doing, see what your surplus is. Divide that surplus among extra offerings, extra investing, and some fun money. It might help to specifically budget a certain amount each month for special giving opportunities above the tithe. Then look around you—ask friends if they know of anyone in need, and watch for opportunities to give that money away. If you're intentional about seeking out those circumstances, you're going to find them!

And remember, whether you're giving a tithe, offering, or some other special contribution, it should come from your heart. It's an important part of any financial plan, and it's really the most fun you can have with your money!

What is a Pulpit?

In short, the pulpit is the place in which the pastor preaches the sermon on any giving Sunday. The word itself comes from a Latin word, pulpitum meaning platform or staging. It's origins is based in Jewish worship practice in synagogues before Jesus' birth. During worship gatherings a rabbi or other leader would teach from a raised platform. Following this tradition, Christian churches have had clergy preach from raised platforms in various locations in the worship space throughout the years.

Here at FFPC we have three major locations in the area of the sanctuary which we call the chancel. The first is the choir loft and space for other musicians whose purpose is self explanatory. The second is the lectern. In ancient times this has been called a reading desk, positioned in a secondary place from the pulpit and has been generally occupied by a layperson where scripture was read. Here at FFPC the lectern is opposite the pulpit, but in ancient churches it could be found in closer association with the choir and singing of the liturgy.



The third is the pulpit. The pastor interprets the Scripture in a sermon and presents the Gospel in a compelling way to the congregation. In traditional Presbyterian/Reformed worship spaces the pulpit is placed in the center of the congregation's view. This symbolizes the centrality of the Word of God to the faith. A good example of this is the chapel at Princeton Theological Seminary. However, this is not the case at FFPC. Why is that?

Rather than try to decipher the historical rationale for diverting from the traditionally reformed worship space (I suppose it has to do with the Oxford movement of the mid 1800's) I would like to suggest the meaning we might take from the current arrangement. First off, the Communion Table is central (rather than the pulpit) highlight the celebration of Communion. The reading of Scripture from the lectern, the singing of Scripture from the Choir loft, and the interpretation of Scripture from the pulpit all serve to focus us on the Gospel celebrated through Communion. All three activities inform, inspire and interpret the sacramental act of communion and prepare us mentally, emotionally and spiritually to commune with Jesus and each other.

The next time you enter the sanctuary, look at the Communion Table. This the place in which we are reminded of Jesus' marvelous invitation to us all. Matthew 11:28 "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." Any anthem from the choir, any musical presentation, any sermon, liturgy or prayer, no matter how eloquent or clumsy, should solely serve to reflect God's great love for us in Jesus Christ, found that a simple invitation.
