

Pastor's Article

Resurrection

It is no coincidence that we celebrate Easter in the spring time. While it is Northern-Hemisphere-centric, seeing the world come to life after the dark of winter hints at the glorious possibilities of spiritual resurrection that Jesus offers us. Many of us look forward to spring every year, and we can rejoice with the same expectation of what God's resurrection power will do in our lives and our communities.

There is some speculation about the origin of the word Easter. Many scholars connect it with an Anglo-Saxon and German goddess named Eostre (there are many other derivations). The month of April was associated with this goddess who was venerated as the divinity of the dawn and therefore connected with spring and new life. There has been much talk about the power of the Christian faith to redeem such words and celebrations, making what was once pagan and idolatrous into the most important Christian holiday of the year.

There also has been some great concern about the use of Easter in our culture at large. Things like baby chicks and bunnies, egg hunts and chocolate candies, are feared to take away from the spiritual and eternal aspects of the holiday. Hallmark and Russell Stover, among others, have gone to great effort to highlight the consumer elements of the holiday rather than the religious.

This has been such a concern that some Christians have felt the need to reject the use of the word Easter and return to an ancient use of the term 'Paschal'. St. Bede, of Ireland, uses the term "Paschal month", referring to April, before the term Easter came into existence. This word is derived from the Hebrew and Greek words for Passover. Christians and churches who use this word will refer to the Paschal Lamb and Paschal season. This helps to redirect the holiday to spiritual concerns and connects our celebration of Resurrection Sunday to the Jewish celebration of Passover. This very is appropriate because that is what



There is, however, some evidence that the word Easter actually came from a German word for resurrection. Without stretching too far into unfamiliar linguistic territory, it seems that an ancient form of the word resurrection could be the source of the word Easter without any pagan and Christian confluence. It sounds like using the term Easter is probably okay. [for more check out this website https://answersingenesis.org/holidays/easter/is-the-name-easter-of-pagan-origin/].

Whether you call it Paschal or the Easter Season I do pray that you experience the joy of new life this coming season. It is the Gospel itself: that our Paschal Lamb, Jesus, would give up his own life for the sins of the world, so that we might be Children of God. This new life is what all of the green grass, new growth, renewed energy, bunny rabbits and chocolates are all pointing to. We are no longer defined by cold hearts, fruitless lives, and blizzarding, biting words. Because of Jesus' resurrection we are defined by a new life, a redeemed purpose, a growing energy and a profound love.

May your Easter/Paschal Season be blessed by our loving Father in Heaven, renewed by the indwelling of the Spirit, and enjoyed in the presence of Christ.

Rolly Update

I was able to visit him at his home in Fraser yesterday and I am happy to report that he is doing well! We visited for a bit and I delivered some financial gifts from a couple of generous individuals. Many of you have asked me how he is doing and I will try to give a short update below.

Rolly likes his job, because he likes that he has a job. He cleans motel rooms, works at the front desk, and does some maintenance work inside and out. It was not a pleasant job during the polar vortex. He works 10AM-6PM Monday-Tuesday, Thursday-Saturday and some Sundays. He makes minimum wage, \$9.25/hour. He has come to the realization that this is not a sustainable wage for a person trying to support a family of four.

English is getting easier and easier for him. He takes online courses in English every day. I can attest to his improving skills; yesterday was the

king drivers training online. He a. After he has a driver's license

first time that we did not need to utilize Google translate! He is also taking drivers training online. He will qualify to take the state drivers exam in the next couple of months. After he has a driver's license he would like to look for a better paying job.

His family is doing well. He misses them fiercely! He has filed all of the paperwork to reunite them, but reunification process will probably take 2 years. Because Malawi is a developing nation with a per capita income average of \$338 US in 2017, his wife has no real hope of work while she is there. Rolly is sending her money every month. He is grateful that we were able to fund school for his boys. He sent me these photos of the boys in their school uniforms.

More good news to share is that he is attending church at First Presbyterian of Warren. He cannot go every week because of work, but he has a ride to get him there when he is able. They have welcomed him to their services with open arms and he is glad to be back in a community of faith.

I'll close this update now before it gets too long. I want to express my gratitude to all of you. Thank you so very much for helping me to aid this family! It has been wonderful getting to know Rolly over these past 5 months. I have big hopes for his future!

Food Bank of Eastern Michigan - March 16, 2019



Over 19% of the people in eastern Michigan are food insecure! The Food Bank of Eastern Michigan provides food to over 400 partner agencies in 22 counties. A hungry person or family could be your child's friend from school, your coworker or even your neighbor.

Here is just one neighbor's story from the Food Bank clients: Daniel supports his wife and two children by working long hours, six days a week, as a painter. In the past, Daniel's family had to make some tough choices between paying for their bills and buying food. The family found assistance through their local food pantry, which distributes healthy food at his daughter's school. "By helping [us] provide for our children now, they are helping us give our children a chance at a better future."

On Saturday, March 16th, eight scouts and five adults performed a mission outreach at the Food Bank on Lapeer Road in Flint. They worked together to repackage frozen squash. In 3 hours they processed 1,400 lb of food for area families. The group carpooled together from church.

Through your pledges to our church's program, the mission committee makes donations to the Food Bank: \$1= 6 meals; \$20 can feed a family of four for 10 days. In addition, our members have supported their Empty Bowls fundraiser in September as well as volunteering our hands to assist them in sorting food for distribution. The Mission Committee wants to thank our members for their numerous methods of supporting the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan!





Christmas In Action




Christmas In Action (CIA) uses volunteer labor along with donated money and materials to perform free home repairs for low income or handicapped senior citizens, repairs that they cannot do or afford to have done. It is a great way for our church to reach out to the community and to serve God's family! Our congregation has been working with CIA for the past 11 years by doing a wide variety of maintenance tasks, e.g., re-doing a bathroom, replacing lower kitchen cabinets and flooring, repairing a living room floor, paneling room walls, repairing a deck, painting, cleaning, landscaping, etc. Each year CIA finds qualified homes to repair in Fenton, Fenton Township, Linden and Argentine. Our congregation usually picks one of them to work on together so that we can also enjoy each other's company. If you would





Led by Pastor Lindsey, You'll discover lessons from each of these women that will help you persevere through the circumstances you are facing today.



Financial Corner



Kids and Money: Four Steps to Responsibility

Dr. Charles Fay of the Love and Logic Institute

Talk About Hard Work and Saving Within Earshot of Your Kids

Modeling is the most powerful teaching tool! That's why it's smart to let our kids see how hard we must work to earn and save money.

Kids shouldn't be overwhelmed with our adult problems. Nevertheless, it does them no favors to keep our financial struggles a secret. Have you ever noticed how kids seem to best remember what they think they are not supposed to hear?

One of the most powerful ways of teaching anything is to talk about it with another adult within earshot of our kids.

When their kids are nearby, wise parents talk on the phone with a friend and say things like, "I'm proud of myself. I wanted to buy that new phone, but I didn't. It was hard to resist, but I need to save money for groceries."

Wise parents take their kids to the bank with them so that their children can hear them say to the teller, "I need to put money into my saving account, so I don't spend it on something I don't need." Smart parents take their kids to the store and think out loud, "I wonder if I really need this? Uh... I'd better put it back. That's too expensive."

This technique is only powerful if we resist the urge to tell our kids what they should be learning by watching and listening to us.

Love and Logic's Four Steps to Responsibility

Step One: Give the child a task he or she can handle.

When it comes to teaching kids responsible money management, the first step involves giving them some type of allowance or "practice money" each week. With younger children, an "allowance" of cookies works better than money.

Step Two: Hope and pray the child blows it.

Most folks agree that it's better for a child to learn money management by eating their cookies too fast at age three than spending their paycheck too fast at age thirty-three! As we always say, the road to wisdom is payed with mistakes. Mistakes made earlier in life have the smallest price tags.

Don't fall into the trap of reminding or lecturing your child at this point. Parents who do, rob their children of essential learning opportunities.

Step Three: Let empathy and logical consequences do the teaching.

When Toby ate all of his crackers before "pay day," did his parents get angry? No! Did they lecture and say, "A graham cracker saved is a graham cracker earned." No! Did they give in when he threw a fit? No!

With great sadness in their voices, they pointed to the large calendar on the refrigerator and said, "Oh Toby... this is so sad. We give more graham crackers on Wednesday. That's two more days."

Because Toby was a normal child, he threw a major fit

Step Four: Give the same task again.

The fourth step to responsibility involves avoiding the temptation to lecture, remind, or tell the child what he/she "should have" learned from the consequence.

Taby's parents just kept providing graphers on Madagadays and Cat



Toby's parents just kept providing crackers on Wednesdays and Saturdays, the scheduled allowance days. Each week they noticed something interesting. Each week, his little stack of grahams lasted a bit longer.

The Most Valuable Gift

A major long-term goal of Love and Logic is to raise kids who grow up and miss us... rather than our money. Isn't it sad that some adult children only call home when they've run out of money?

There are few gifts we can give our children that are more valuable than knowing how to handle money wisely. Adults who lack these skills live lives full of disappointment and stress. Money can't buy happiness... but wasting it can sure create a life of sadness!

There's good news! By following the tips listed above, there's no need for our kids to live their lives fearing the bill collector.

A good friend of mine was raised with Love and Logic. Reflecting back on her childhood, she often comments:

When we were kids, our parents always gave us what we needed... and expected us to earn what we wanted. It seemed like we were always asking the neighbors for odd jobs. I'll never forget the summer I spent washing cars, mowing lawns, and pulling weeds. By that August, I'd earned enough for the stereo I wanted. I'll never forget the feeling of pride I felt going to the store and paying for it with my own money!

It's never too early or too late to give your kids the gift of pride!



Five-Finger Prayers



Prayer is a conversation with God, not a formula. Yet sometimes we might need to use a "method" to freshen up our prayer time. We can pray the Psalms or other Scriptures (such as The Lord's Prayer), or use the ACTS method (Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, and Supplication). I recently came across this "Five-Finger Prayer" to use as a guide when praying for others:

- When you fold your hands, the thumb is nearest you. So begin by praying for those closest to you—your loved ones (Phil. 1:3–5).
- The index finger is the pointer. Pray for those who teach—Bible teachers and preachers, and those who teach children (1 Thess. 5:25).
- The next finger is the tallest. It reminds you to pray for those in authority over you—national and local leaders, and your supervisor at work (1 Tim. 2:1–2).
- The fourth finger is usually the weakest. Pray for those who are in trouble or who are suffering (James 5:13–16).
- Then comes your little finger. It reminds you of your smallness in relation to God's greatness. Ask Him to supply your needs (Phil. 4:6, 19).

Whatever method you use, just talk with your Father. He wants to hear what's on your heart.

Worship



HOLY WEEK

Holy Week is the most important week in the Church year! It is a time when we celebrate in a special way the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. We remember his actions, reflect on his messages, and recommit to living as his disciples in the world today.

Palm Sunday, April 14: Sunday before Easter, when the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem is celebrated. It originated in the late 3rd or 4th Century in the Jerusalem Church, as they read scriptures or sang hymns as they stopped at numerous holy sites. In the 6th and 7th Century, a ritual blessing of the palms was added, and in the 8th Century a morning procession was celebrated in the Western Church. Many Palm Sunday traditions remain the same as those celebrated in the 10th Century, where many people take palms home and place them in their houses or make palm crosses.

Maundy Thursday, April 18: Commemorates the foot washing and Last Supper of Jesus with the Apostles. Jesus gathered to eat the Passover feast in the evening, so this service is typically held in the evening with Communion. The English word "maundy" come from the Latin "mandatum" or mandate/commandment from Jesus' words "A new commandment I give to you: that you love one another as I have loved you."

Tenebrae Service: Some Protestant denominations have picked up the Catholic tradition of holding a Tenebrae service on Maundy Thursday or Good Friday in the evening after dark. There is a gradual extinguishing of lights and candles as the service and readings progress. The readings often come from the Gospels and trace Jesus' final week between Palm Sunday and Jesus' crucifixion. Our church does a reader's theater version of a Tenebrae service, where Jesus' followers share their thoughts on Jesus' final week with them.



Good Friday, April 19: It may seem odd that people celebrate the day Jesus was crucified as "good." What Jesus went through being whipped, beaten, mocked and killed in a violent way were not good. What Christ accomplished for us is victory over death, by demonstrating God's love for us by dying in our place. Good Friday commemorates Jesus' crucifixion and three days in the grave before his resurrection. The sanctuary is stripped of all ornamentation and colored banners and often replaced with black.

Easter Sunday, April 21: Commemorates the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, and God's victory over death! Easter Sunday is something we should celebrate every day of our lives, not just once a year, but we take this special day to recognize God's great gift of eternal life for us. Traditions vary in each denomination and culture, but they call attention to new life in Christ and the death of our old selves and rebirth into new life.





Our congregation will be proudly waving Eco-Palms, this Palm Sunday, in partnership with Lutheran World Relief. We are helping palm harvesters in Latin America, their families and communities find pathways out of poverty.

HERE'S WHAT MAKES ECO-PALMS DIFFERENT:

ECOLOGICALLY FRIENDLY

Fair prices for quality palms encourage sustainable harvesting, meaning better income long into the future.

ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

Eco-Palms are sorted and packed within the harvesting community, extending income opportunities to even more people.

SUSTAINABLE INCOME

Eco-Palms harvesters often earn five to six times more per frond than traditional palms, and a portion of the purchase price goes directly back to the community.





FROM TANZANIA TO THE U.S.

African Palms is an outreach ministry of St. John's Episcopal Church in Olney, Maryland. African Palms provides palm crosses to churches, schools, hospitals, prisons, book stores, and church goods distributors for use on Palm Sunday and other special occasions. The crosses are handwoven by villagers near Masasi, Tanzania and are made from the dried leaves of the dwarf palm.

African Palms was founded in 1965 by Father Alan Talbot. Having served as a missionary in Tanzania, Father Talbot observed the poverty of the people and sought ways to help them increase their income. He encouraged the villagers to weave palm crosses which would be sold to churches for use on Palm Sunday. In 1976 the women of St. John's Episcopal Church accepted the mission of distributing the palm crosses to churches throughout the United States; African Palms USA was born and is now a major outreach ministry of the church.

GRANTS AT WORK

African Palms awards grants up to \$5,000 to organizations for use in projects that benefit the entire community. Projects are based on need and are funded from the net sales of palm crosses and totes, along with 100% of donations received.

Projects receiving grant funding in recent years include disaster and refugee relief, medical and public health programs, agriculture ventures, clean drinking water systems, and education.

Why do Presbyterian Christians call the Communion Table a 'table' and not an 'altar'? Did you know that there is not an 'altar' in our sanctuary? Many large books are written on this subject; I do want to highlight the limitations of discussing such a heavy topic in such a small article.

In the simplest of terms, the Catholic Church is celebrating the Mass and the Reformed tradition celebrates Communion or the Eucharist (Greek for Thanksgiving). The Mass is a liturgy that reenacts Jesus' sacrifice on the cross for us, and therefore there is an altar where the sacrifice occurs. It is this reenactment that requires the term altar to be used. The priest speaks the words and the bread and wine become the actual body and blood of Christ.

The Reformed perspective considers the celebration, not as a reenactment, but rather a memorial or a symbolic remembrance of Christ's sacrifice and resurrection. At FFPC we remember what Christ has done for us and celebrate the resurrection life that we live in together as a church in the Spirit. For most Protestant churches and FFPC, the bread and wine/juice are symbols that help us to remember and celebrate. We also remember and rejoice in the enteral hope we have in Christ because of the cross. Suffice to say, FFPC celebrates the present, spiritual reality of Christ's sacrifice and therefore we need a table for our celebration, rather than an altar.

While it might seem like stacking angels on the head of a pin, these differences can be very important to a lot of people and need to be taken seriously. Theological positions tend to trickle down into every-day life, even into the words we use for the furniture in our sanctuaries!

Have you ever heard of an 'altar' call? While this term might be unfamiliar to those in Presbyterian circles, we generally find it in some Baptist, Nazarene, Assemblies of God churches, and the like. The term has an association with revivals and evangelical efforts. The use of the word 'altar' in this case may not have to do with Communion (as a celebration of God's goodness to us), as much as it has to do with a response to God's goodness toward us. We hear the Gospel and we respond by offering our lives to God. Many churches who have 'altar calls' do not have physical altars, but instead use the term figuratively to encourage individuals to commit their lives to Christ.

The reason that you might be hard pressed to experience an altar call at FFPC is that the Reformed Tradition is concerned with maintaining that Jesus' sacrifice is the only one that can and does have any effect on our justification before God. Therefore we do not reenact Christ's sacrifice during our worship; instead we celebrate the one great, final sacrifice that results in sweet Communion with Christ and with each other. We also are careful not to relate any sacrifice of our own lives to that of Christ's, knowing that nothing we can ever do could have the same effect, or possibly be compared to the Cross.

The significance of a Communion Table rather than an Altar in our sanctuary is what a table symbolically suggests to us as we worship together. Scripture tells us that God is near to us (Psalm 145:18), and that God's desire is for us to be God's people and for God to be our God (Leviticus 26:12). The next time you walk into our sanctuary look at the Communion Table; it's not just as a reminder of what Jesus has done for us, but it's an invitation to know God more fully and to enjoy him more deeply.
