PASTORS ARTICLE DISCIPLINE IS NOT A BAD WORD

When we talk about discipline most of us think of parenting and the principal's office. Discipline is what happens when we need to be corrected and our behavior adjusted. However discipline is also used in a positive sense when we talk about sports, music and artistic skills like carpentry or art. Discipline is what we call the practice, the lessons and the rehearsals. It is the inner drive to critically examine your craft, and the exterior effort of being taught and led that we call discipline. Just as we need discipline to excel in art and sports, we need discipline in our spiritual lives as well. These next few weeks we will be highlighting various spiritual disciplines during our worship services as an effort to grow deeper in our faith as a church.

All of the things that we call spiritual disciplines are normal activities in the Christian Life and many times in life in general. They become spiritual disciplines because of the effort of concentration on specific actions in a disciplined way for spiritual benefit. While spontaneity in our faith is valuable and flexibility to what the Spirit draws us to is crucial, we are called to grow in grace and knowledge (2 Peter 3:18) and that takes a concerted effort.

Our first topic of the month will be PRAYER. Both spontaneous and prepared, private and public, prayer is a huge topic. Being disciplined in prayer is a great gift and a skill to be developed. There are many ways to grow in prayer. Learning to pray publicly, gathering with others to pray, and keeping a prayer journal are all ways that can enhance our prayer life. There are a multitude of different ways to pray and many ways to grow in our conversations with God.

LOVE can be a discipline as well, although we most commonly think of it as an emotion. It might sound like disciplined love is an oxymoron. Ultimately, love is a virtue (not just an emotion) and being disciplined in acts of love does not callus us. Intentionally acting in love causes our hearts to grow and increases our ability to feel and to respond emotionally to others around us. A key part to being disciplined in love is that we can do most things in a loving manner and therefore love can become an innate quality of our lives rather then just a discipline. Disciplined love stretches us and may find us loving people we couldn't imagine and in ways that we wouldn't dare.

Living in GRATITUDE is like planting seeds and watering them well. Rarely are seeds like those barren. What a richness we can experience if we are but thankful for the gifts of God and those around us. Even in difficult circumstances there is always something to be thankful for, and the discipline of looking for it shapes our hearts and opens our eyes to the activity of God in our world. It is those difficult circumstances that call for discipline surrounding gratitude. It is too easy to extenuate the negative and descend into despair.

Acts of MERCY and KINDNESS are fruit of the Holy Spirit working in our lives. These can be done by individuals or groups of people. When groups of people get together to accomplish something in Christ's name we call it mission. Joining a group to work at a food bank, trash pick up at a local park with friends, and raising funds for hunger issues all are part of God's mission in the world. However God's Mission is not confined to our own neighborhood: it is a global initiative. Supporting and praying for churches and ministries worldwide is a discipline that expands our notion of God's work in the world. It can also challenge us about who God is as we see people that we perceive as aliens become friends and even brothers and sisters in Christ.

Being intentional about spiritual practices will produce personal growth. Concerted efforts to improve spiritual practice will also sew bonds of faith between believers. All in all, spiritual disciplines allow us to know more about who God is and what God would have us do. We look forward to seeing what God will do with us as we learn together this month.


ADOPT A PET MISSION OPPORTUNITY MAY 18TH, 2019 9AM-1PM

ABOUT ADOPT-A-PET

Adopt-A-Pet is a non-proft animal rescue for dogs/pups and cats/kittens. Their mission is to provide a means to place unwanted, adoptable animals into appropriate, loving homes. They hold themselves to a high standard – one which looks out for the physical AND mental well being of their animals. All of their animals are current on shots and testing, spayed/neutered, and wormed prior to placing them in loving homes. All potential adopters are screened to ensure an appropriate match is made.

In 2018, Adopt-A-Pet found loving homes for almost 1200 cats and dogs. Many needed major vet care.



2019 CHRISTMAS IN ACTION

Tri-County Christmas In Action performed significant home repairs to two houses (one in Byron and one in Gaines) on Saturday, April 27 2019. Patricia is the homeowner and resident. Her daughter Tisha was the person requesting our assistance.

Six volunteers from our church worked at the house in Byron. Our team helped to repair/rebuild a wheelchair ramp and clean up the yard. The roof was also re-shingled by a couple men who were very familiar with roofing. The homeowner could no longer safely use the wheelchair ramp before it was repaired. Her large yard needed a lot of clean up. She is most appreciative of our service.

Our mission budget enables us to contribute to the Christmas In Action budget each year. Our time, talents and treasure are making a positive difference in God's world.



EVER WONDERED WHAT IT D BE LIKE TO SPONSOR A CHILD


Here is an example from Jan Foster, who signed up to do just that during World Vision's Matthew 25 Challenge last Fall.

I would like to introduce Catherine. She is almost 6 and lives with her mother, a farmer, in Kenya. She likes playing with her "babies" (dolls) and helping with chores. I know because I am her sponsor through World Vision. I had been looking for a concrete way to demonstrate my conviction that the love of God, Grace of Christ and Power of the Spirit are never limited by boarders, nationality, gender, or skin color. That is when our youth offered the chance to sponsor a child.

Included in my welcome packet from World Vision was a video of Catherine's village and the school built and maintained by World Vision. The young man narrating the tour of the tiny school was so excited about their newest school upgrade, two cinderblock bathrooms. It was a big improvement over the single lean-to they had before and he was thrilled.

World Vision is our "go-between". They maintain Catherine's privacy and mine, translate and deliver snail mail (I have two letters with pictures drawn by Catherine) and email, and offer suggestions on how to communicate with someone whose life is soooo different from mine. They keep me updated on Catherine's life and offer the chance to send her small gifts for special days (a little colorful booklet in her language is on its way for Easter- mail takes several weeks to go between us.) It is a blessing to help show the love of God in such a tangible way. Thank you, Youth Group.

DEACON S CORNER

It is a very heart-warming experience to be a part of something that helped so many grateful and inneed families. Both Maureen and I felt the emotional response from the families as they entered the youth room and looked around with amazement at all they were receiving. When we helped take the filled grocery bags and Easter baskets to their car, we received words of gratitude, many hugs and even tears of joy and appreciation.

One woman who picked up groceries and Easter baskets for her children said, "Wow, this is incredible, I never expected this much help." When I spoke with each family to remind them of the distribution date, one woman said to me, "This is such a blessing to our family." All the others said "thank you" several times during our conversations.

One family who received assistance this year adopts children from the Ukraine when they "age out of the orphanage" and they become homeless the day they turn 16. Their family has adopted close to 40 children over the years. When they successfully launch them into adulthood, they are able to adopt another teenager and begin the process again. But many of the local families we helped are experiencing temporary need to due a medical situation or loss of a job.

The generous response from our congregation, over and above the money received for the VG's gift certificates, allowed our Easter Project committee to purchase a large container of laundry detergent and a pack of toilet tissue for each family. As soap and paper products are not allowed to be purchased using public assistance, these items were particularly helpful to some of the families we served.



KIDS AND MONEY FACE TO FACE WITH REALITY

Dr. Charles Fay of the Love and Logic Institute

Note from Tina Ritchie: Here is part three in this series in learning tips on how you can give your kids the gift of financial responsibility. You can also find more solutions to raising financially responsible kids by checking out the audio CD "Parents are Not ATMs" or the book From Innocence to Entitlement from our church library.

Inflation

Kids suffer from inflation. The cost of learning how to live in our world goes up daily. The price a child pays today to learn about friendships, school, learning, decision making, and responsibility is the cheapest it will ever be. Learning an important lesson today may be a bargain.

The older a child gets, the bigger the decisions become. Elementary school children make many decisions with affordable price tags. This means they can pick themselves up and try again if things don't work out. High school students are making life-and-death decisions—about fast cars, riding in the back of pickup trucks, drugs, alcohol, and other issues—on a daily basis.

Some children are allowed to learn at an early age not to antagonize bigger children. The cost of this knowledge is a few minor bumps and bruises. Others, protected from this experience, have to learn the same lesson during their teenage years at the cost of serious physical injury, usually at the hands of a much stronger person. I'd rather my child learn at an early age when the price is much more affordable.

I met a parent who likes to loan money to her young children. She believes this is a great opportunity for them to learn about responsibility and the way our banking system works.

She expects the child to sign a promissory note, provide collateral just as an adult would do at the bank, and pay off the loan by a certain date. She is actually training and preparing her children for the real world.

Recently she repossessed a video game when her son did not pay off his loan on time. She said that it really hurt her to have to take this away.

However, her most convincing statement was, "My son is really lucky. Here he is, only 10 years old, and he knows so much about the responsibility of paying back loans, collateral, and even repossessions. All it cost him was a \$29 video game. It was a bargain."

She added, "My neighbor's boy learned the same lesson at the age of 26 when the bank repossessed his \$2,900 car. My son had a 16 year head start on the neighbor boy. Now he has an additional piece of wisdom to carry him through life."

Handing the Problem Back

My child is no longer a young child. What can I do to help them learn about responsibility? Let's hear about a father and his son Blake.

Dumping his bags on the floor, Blake announced, "Dad, like this trooper gave me a ticket and it's not fair. He comes up and gets like all belligerent, telling me he ought to arrest me because I was going 30 miles over the limit. I told him, 'Like lighten up, dude. There's no one else on the road and it's like what's the big deal? I know it's a work zone, but it's after hours, man.' And then he like cops a real attitude on me. So, Dad, will you just take care of the ticket and not make a big deal out of it? How am I supposed to have a good vacation if I have to go to court and mess with this?"

In the past, Dad reacted to these situations with anger, but had always bailed Blake out. No wonder Blake thought this latest brush with the law was just another minor irritation.



What a shock! Dad didn't get mad. He simply reacted with, "Oh, man. How are you going to solve this? I bet it's going to cost you a bundle."

"What do you mean cost me a bundle? You're the one who wanted me to be home so soon. I'd have to sell my car to raise that kind of dough. Then how am I supposed to get to school?"

"I really don't know, Blake. If you don't figure it out in a couple of days, let me know and maybe I can share what some other people have tried in situations like this. The only thing I know for sure is that I won't be paying for anyone else's tickets."

Blake used all of the arguing techniques that had worked for him in the past, but Dad held his ground responding with, "I know, and what did I say?"

Blake stomped off muttering, "Oh, whatever."

It's painful to watch our children learn through natural consequences. But that pain is the price we pay to teach our children. We either hurt as we watch our children learn through life's natural consequences, or we hurt as we watch them grow up unable to take good care of themselves.

- Admit that you have sinned and need forgiveness.
- Thank God for sending Jesus to die on the cross to forgive your sins.
- Tell God that you trust Jesus as your personal Savior and you choose to follow Him.
- Ask God to make you the kind of person He wants you to be.



Trust God to empower you.

Jesus lives forever inside you. (See Galatians 2:20; John 10:28, 15:5.) The Holy Spirit will always guide you. (See John 16:13; Acts 1:8.)

Tips for Sharing Christ with Children

- Remember that Jesus welcomes children to come to Him (Matthew 19:14).
- Pray before sharing to prepare your own heart and sensitivity.
- Discern each child's spiritual condition: Ready to respond? Struggling to understand? Resistant?
- Open the Bible and use it to clearly share the Gospel. Focus on trusting Christ (rather than simply praying or inviting Him into their physical heart or saying the right words).
- Encourage a child to express his or her faith (trust) in Jesus through prayer.
- Use visuals, such as a bridge illustration, a wordless book, Gospel bracelet, or diagrams to help communicate difficult words and concepts to children.
- After a child responds to God's offer of forgiveness, encourage public profession of faith in Christ to friends, family, and others.
- Deal with children individually. This
 helps to clarify their motives and
 know they are trusting Christ rather
 than imitating their friends.
- Go through the Gospel presentation twice. Explain the Good News the first time. Then, review the Gospel and offer an opportunity to respond the second time.
- Don't manipulate a child to simply do what you want. Discern the heart attitude and present the Gospel to those you consider ready to trust Christ.

WORSHIP

FRONT PEW by Pastor Robbie Carnes

What is a Narthex and why do we have one? Narthex comes from a Latinized Greek word meaning "porch," referring to the entrance of the sanctuary. Thinking about the FFPC church building, we have an old Narthex and a new Narthex. If you enter the stairs and porch from South Leroy Street, you enter through the old Narthex. The new Narthex is the space between the sanctuary and Fellowship Hall. The New Narthex addition to our building has coat racks, bulletins and bathrooms. Both Narthexes can be used to 'listen in' on the worship service. The Ushers use the old Narthex a great deal for their tasks as well as Communion servers. Both rooms provide us with spaces to prepare to enter the sanctuary.

The Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church describes the Narthex historically as what we might think of here at FFPC. Byzantine Churches had a Narthex that was separated from the nave (the sanctuary) by columns, rails or a low wall. The Narthex would sometimes have a baptismal font, so that infants and adults could be baptized before they entered the nave. This still can be seen in some Catholic churches. It was also used for believers to 'remember their baptism' as a way to prepare for worship.

Many times there would be two parts of the Narthex. The esonarthex, which would be the enclosed part of the Narthex as a whole, was used for formal preparation for worship. The exonarthex is the outside portion of the Narthex in which more secular things might take place such as community news or friendly conversation. While I don't suggest we change the current names, this reflects the different uses between our 'new' narthex and Fellowship Hall here at FFPC.



Ancient churches considered the Narthex as a special place for specific people. These people include catechumens, penitents, and energumens. Catechumens were those who needed to prepare in faith and knowledge and observe worship from the Narthex until their faith was confirmed. Penitents, those who did not feel prepared to enter into worship because of sin, regret or censure, could remain in the Narthex until they were ready to enter fully into worship. In fact, in the Eastern Churches today, special services of penitence and funerals are held in the Narthex. Energumens refer to demon possessed people or hysterical people who received special care but were not admitted into worship. Presumably because they would disrupt the order of worship.

At FFPC we don't exclude anyone from worship as ancient believers did. However, it still is important to prepare our hearts for worship. You might want to consider these kinds questions as you enter the sanctuary:

- "Am I prepared for worship?"
- "Am I faithfully offering sacrifices of praise and gratitude to God?" (Rather than the countless others things that I could be doing on any given Sunday.)
- "Is there some spiritual concern that I need to deal with before I worship?"
- "Is there something in my life that is distracting me from participating fully in the worship service?"
- "Do I need to confess to another my guilt and seek forgiveness?"
- "Do I need prayer for deep regret or shame?"
- "Is my heart ready to gratefully receive God's Grace and Mercy?"
- "How can I focus on God, rather than myself or others, as the congregation worships together?"

The next time you pass through the Narthex you might pause to consider how you are prepared for the worship service. It is not your physical condition or how you are dressed that matters, it is the condition of your heart that matters most.

1 Samuel 16:7b "God does not view things the way men do. People look on the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart."

Member Question: Why does Pastor Lindsey or Pastor Robbie preach at other churches on some Sundays? If they are called to be pastor's here at Fenton, what is their responsibility to these other churches, if any?

Answer: Both Pastors have, from time to time, preached at other churches in the area. Many times our presence gives the called pastor an opportunity to go on vacation or Educational event. Sometimes we are part of a larger group of pastors in the Presbytery filling a vacant pulpit because a church is in a leadership transition.

Far and away these have all been Presbyterian Churches. We call ourselves a Connectional Church and this stems from deep theological commitments and a close reading of scripture. Suffice it to say, Presbyterians believe that we are responsible for each other and we are bound to each other by the Holy Spirit. Therefore if a Presbyterian church has need of a pastor to fill an empty pulpit or moderate a Session meeting, they will look for area Presbyterian Pastors to fill that role. This is part of what it means to belong to a Presbytery and a great encouragement to a church that might be struggling.
