I was in the ear doctor's office, sitting on the examination chair while I waited for the nurse to come back. I had forgotten to bring the magazine I was reading from the waiting room and my eyes were drawn to all of the detailed posters and informational flyers that plastered the walls and were arranged in document holders on the counter. Funny how much you can learn about the world when you have nothing better to do than read the writing on the wall.

December 29th One Worship Service 10:00am Did you know there is a ear condition called Presbycusis? This is a condition in which higher frequency sounds (and as it develops, lower frequencies) become harder to hear and thus make deciphering speech difficult.

People with Presbycusis often notice that speech is loud enough, but not clear – as if the talker is mumbling. Having Presbycusis can result in higher-pitched sounds of speech, such as/s/and/th/, sounding unclear and indistinct to the listener. This can lead to confusion (e.g. not being able to tell the difference between the words soot and foot), which can impact an individual's ability to understand conversations, particularly in noisy situations. This can make communication in bars, cafés, clubs and restaurants extremely difficult if not impossible. (https://hearnet.org.au/hearingproblems/presbycusis)

You might experience some of these symptoms, and the Michigan Ear Institute includes symptoms such as the loss of sound sensitivity, having to ask people to repeat themselves, not being able to hear women's voices or children's voices as easily as male voices, finding the TV volume is too loud, tinnitus or "head noise", which produces buzzing or ringing in the ear.

The attentive reader will notice the similarity between the words Presbyterian and Presbycusis. This is due to the Greek root 'Presby' that mean 'elder' or 'aged'. However, no matter what age you are you can suffer from Spiritual Presbycusis. As we learn about who God is, we might think we have learned it all, and the sensitivity of our heart's ear becomes dull. Having grown aged in our relationship with God, we might find ourselves not as readily engaging with those around us and needing to ask them to repeat themselves because we are not really present with them.

We might find our hearts tuning out certain frequencies. We no longer care to listen to children, or women, or men, or democrats, or republicans, or...

We have blocked certain voices from our ears. It might be that our spirituality is aged to such a degree that we can no longer participate with others in learning, fun or fellowship, and our heads are filled with self-fabricated noise of our own perspective.

In times of chaos and stress we may feel unmoored. Unable to

clearly hear and decipher what is being said around us, we hesitate making decisions. It is as if there is too much noise in our hearts and we become deaf to everything rather than being able to hear the still small voice of our Savior.

If these are the symptoms of your heart, I urge you to consider how the Advent season might bring you to a place of healing. Just as you should listen to the ear doctor if you are experiencing the physical symptoms, if you are experiencing these spiritual symptoms you should listen in the little room where Gabriel spoke to Mary. You should ponder how Joseph risked public shame in order to be obedient to God. You should consider Zechariah's silence until his son was born. You should contemplate how the Shepherds were transformed from the marginalized into the announcers of the promise coming true.

As we dwell on the story of God's promise coming true, our hearts turn attentive to God's work in the world. Our spiritual ears become cleaned out and we develop sensitivity to the Spirit's voice. As we wonder at the birth of the Christ-child, our hearts learn to become younger and we find ourselves transformed.

May the fragrance of His peace, Soar through your heart And may His love poured out, flow to the depths of your deepest sigh, And may the hope that will not deceive, ease every pain, And may His joy rush over you and cause you to Delight in the path He has called you to, And may your ears tingle as you hear anew, the great things our God has done and will do!

# I'M GOING TO BRING HEALING TO YOUR HURTING HEART.





As a church we have sent Pastor Lindsey to serve as an Interim Pastor at Trinity United Presbyterian Church for a season. In this column you will find sermons, articles and stories about her Interim work.

The following are excerpts from a sermon that Pastor Lindsey Carnes gave at Trinity United Presbyterian Church.

#### "At Home in the Wilderness--A Time of New Beginnings," 2 Cor 5:14-19, Deut 8:1-20 Pastor Lindsey Carnes

This is our last sermon in this Wilderness series. We celebrate that the wilderness is a time of new beginnings. Another way to think of it is that wilderness times are temporary. A retired pastor was once asked, what was his favorite phrase in scripture. He replied that "It came to pass" occurred 453 times in the King James Version of the Bible. That is very good news, if you're contemplating wilderness time. Wilderness times come, but they don't stay. They are not permanent. They pass. Wilderness time always comes to an end and is always followed by a new beginning.

According to Dante, written over the gates of hell are the words, "All hope abandon, ye who enter here!" Sometimes we imagine that those words are written over the gate to the wilderness and we are tempted to abandon hope. The good news of our Christian faith, however, is that the wilderness is never the final destination and hope is alive even in that desolate territory.

Wilderness times generally mark the end of one phase and the beginning of a new phase of our lives. Jesus' difficult and lonely time of testing in the Judean wilderness gave way to a new beginning—the beginning of His public ministry. It prepared Him and strengthened Him for it in a way that perhaps nothing else could.

New beginnings stand at the heart of the gospel message. No matter who we are or what we've done, no matter if the wilderness is of our own making, God is always present in the wilderness with us and can lead us through it and out of it. When we find ourselves in the wilderness of sin, guilt, and separation from God and from others, there is a way out of the wilderness and a new beginning. God provides that way in Christ.


The apostle Paul was an expert in new beginnings. He knew well the spiritual territory we call "the wilderness" because he spent a great deal of time there! Paul also knew the power of being made new and set free from the wilderness of a broken relationship with God and with others. Paul wrote, "So if anyone is in Christ, they are a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us" (2 Corinthians 5:17-19). The good news of Christ is, that no matter who you are or what you have done, there is always the chance for a new beginning. In Christ, we are new creations: "Everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"



in so many words, said, "I wish you were dead." He asked for his inheritance—not at all appropriate, since his father was very much alive! The father gave his younger son his share of the inheritance and the son ran away to a distant country, where he squandered it all. All that money his father had worked hard to earn and set aside for his son was just thrown away satisfying the son's every whim and desire and trying to buy friends. It was awful!

It didn't take him long to blow his inheritance and he found himself homeless and hungry. This young boy found himself doing the unthinkable. He wound up feeding pigs and was so hungry he even wanted to eat the pig slop. He was in the wilderness! When he came to his senses, he said, "How many of my father's hired men have food to spare, and here I am starving to death!" (Luke 15:17 NIV). So he decided to go home and beg his father for forgiveness. As he was approaching the familiar place that once had been his home, his father saw him. His father was so overjoyed and excited that he ran to his son, threw his arms around him, and kissed him.

Jesus taught us that God is like that loving father. If you're in the wilderness, feeling separated from God—and perhaps you even ran into that wilderness yourself—it may be difficult to believe, but God is like that father and will run to meet you and welcome you home with open arms, ready to give you a new beginning. Ultimately, the wilderness never has the last word!



But, what about the greatest wilderness? What about death? The good news of our faith is that even the wilderness of death comes to pass. In Christ, Paul observed, "Death has been swallowed up in victory" (1 Corinthians 15:54). The good news of our faith is that even out of the wilderness of suffering and death, and even out of the wilderness of the death of someone we love, there is a new beginning. Death is swallowed up in victory through Jesus Christ. Death never has the final word.

Betsy and Woody Stover, were raising their children here in Michigan when their youngest daughter Ele died at only 11 months old. The Stovers saw that their three children, ages 3-7, were grieving the death of their sister, but not in the same way as adults. Out of that experience, they founded an organization to help children and teens who are grieving the loss of a someone close to them. Ele's Place was founded to provide peer support and counseling to ensure that no child grieves alone. Out of that terrible wilderness came a new beginning for that family and for many other families suffering the pain of losing a child in death.

The good news of our faith is that the wilderness never has the last word. When Jesus was on the cross, He was in the darkest wilderness of His life. Jesus was nailed to that cross to die as a criminal by that cruel Roman means of execution. As Jesus hung there, the life draining from Him, He experienced the rejection, the anguish, and the loneliness of the darkest wilderness. Jesus cried out, quoting Psalm 22, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" But, we know that the cross was not the end. We, who will walk the wilderness way with Christ, know what we celebrate each Sunday. We know that death will never have the final word. We know that the wilderness "comes to pass."

## Food Bank of Eastern Michigan November 16, 2019

Over 19% of the people in eastern Michigan are food insecure! The Food Bank of Eastern Michigan provides food to over 400 partner agencies in 22 counties. A hungry person or family could be your child's friend from school, your co-worker or even your neighbor.

Here is just one neighbor's story from the Food Bank clients:


Daniel supports his wife and two children by working long hours, six days a week, as a painter. In the past, Daniel's family had to make some tough choices between paying for their bills and buying food. The family found assistance through their local food pantry, which distributes healthy food at his daughter's school. "By helping [us] provide for our children now, they are helping us give our children a chance at a better future."

On Saturday, November 16th, fifteen volunteers from our church performed a mission outreach at the Food Bank on Howard



Avenue in Flint. They worked together to review, clean and sort through pallets of food. The group carpooled together from church.

Through your pledges to our church's program, the mission committee makes donations to the Food Bank: \$1= 6 meals; \$20 can feed a family of four for 10 days. In addition, our members have supported their Empty Bowls fund raiser in September as well as volunteering our hands to assist them in sorting food for distribution. 
### THE GIFT OF GIVING DURING THE HOLIDAY SEASON

Our monthly mortgage payment will be paid using (1) designated building fund contributions as they are received and, if needed to make the payment, (2) money from the operating budget. If more designated money is received than is needed to make the required mortgage payment, overpayments will be made to reduce interest costs and retire the mortgage as soon as we can.




Adult Bible Study

Sign-up in Fellowship Hall by December 22 to order your participant pack. Cost \$27 includes book, workbook, and Day by Day devotion journey.


## From the Library Committee



## BOUNDARIES CORNER

**How to feel better about change happening in your life** from Dr. Henry Cloud, co-author of the Boundaries books.

#### Henry says:

I want to share with you 12 principles to make change happen. These little tidbits are easy to digest and will help you shift your mindset in a positive direction to help realistic change seem more tangible to you.

1. **Strive for progress, not perfection**. Make it your goal to get better, rather than to be perfect. Change is a process. Take setbacks in stride and continue going forward.

2. **Be honest with yourself.** Come out of denial and acknowledge there is a problem. Be honest with yourself about what these destructive patterns are doing to your life.

Realize you are not the entire solution. Sometimes you cannot change these patterns on your own. Sometimes change must be empowered by others. Reach outside of yourself and ask for help.
 See today's actions in a different time zone. To help you take ownership of a pattern in your life, look at what you are doing today and play it forward... see it in a future time zone.

5. **Believe and have vision**. To make change happen, believe it is possible and have a clear vision of where you want to be.

6. **Utilize external gauges and limits**. Invest in the changes you want to make. Track and monitor your progress.

7. **Set up reminders.** Set up triggers or cues to remind you to follow through on new patterns you want to incorporate into your life.

8. **Stay connected with your personal belief system.** We were designed to be connected to a spiritual power greater than ourselves. Stay connected to this power.

9. **Fire the bad boss inside.** There is a voice in your head that guides you. Listen to the talk that encourages you to change for the better – and eliminate the negative voices that will hold you back.

10. **Do it before you know how.** Sometimes the only way to be confident that you can do something is to just do it, even if you aren't sure you are ready. Believe in yourself and take that step.

11. **Fill the vacuum**. Fill your heart with love and your mind with wisdom. Don't leave room for fear and self-doubt.

12. Do the right things, at the right time, for the right amount of time. Positive changes take time. Do the right things at the right time and give them time to take root.

When I think of people who take action to see change happen for themselves, I think of the word "courage." The way that we have done things before, and the patterns and behaviors are very familiar. But....there is a reason why something new is needed. Even so, it is SO tempting to just try again. Emotional ties, false hope, denial, and even our strengths we have once used can fuel that temptation. And, the resistance to facing the reality of the hard questions: "Why do I think it will be different this time?" But, creating tomorrow is going to require doing some things new and different, and that takes courage. And courage comes from getting together and supporting each other to reach the vision, the goal.

December 1st, 1st Sunday in Advent (Hope), Saint Andrew's Day "Transformations: Mary, from Questioning to Trust", Luke1:26-37 So any of us have questions.
