

## PASTOR'S LETTER

### Building Congregational Vitality by Pastor Robbie Carnes

The Presbyterian Mission Agency(PMA) has invited our entire denomination to a vision for our churches that calls us to engage with the world as we work out our faith in mission. This vision is to become Matthew 25 communities and/or churches that 1. Build Congregational Vitality, 2. Dismantle Structural Racism, 3. Eradicate Systemic Poverty. These three areas are ways that the church can be relevant in the world and have a healing presence in our various communities. These are ways in which we, as a church, can focus our mission so that God's love, justice and mercy can shine forth in a contagious way.

The FFPC Mission Committee and Session are considering ways in which our church can implement this vision into the life of FFPC. In the meantime, this article will spend the next few months exploring the three elements of the Matthew 25 vision and how it relates to the biblical passage of Matthew 25.



Matthew 25 consists of three parables that I believe relate to the three elements of the PMA's vision. The first parable is that of the 10 Bridesmaids.

**Building Congregational Vitality** 

There were ten of them—Bridesmaids who had gathered to keep the bride company until the bridegroom should come. They had dreams of the wedding. How marvelous it will be. The Bride and Bridegroom will parade through the village and everyone will come out to celebrate. The little children will frolic and dance. The old ones will sway and grin. Even the Rabbis will cease their constant study to come and enjoy the celebration.

But for now they had to wait for the bridegroom. He could come at any time and no one knows for sure. He could come during the day or even unexpectedly, late at night. There will be some warning. The Bridegroom will send a man ahead walking through the streets crying, "Behold! The bridegroom is coming!" But this could happen at anytime and the bridesmaids must be ready to meet him.

If the Bridegroom chose to come at night it is important to remember that no one is allowed out after dark without a lighted lamp. Our bridesmaids all carried lamps and all fell asleep waiting for the bridegroom. Then the announcement came at midnight, "Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out and meet him!", five foolish bridesmaid did not have enough oil in their lamps and could not greet the bridegroom with their lights shining. Doubly foolish, they went out into the dark to buy more oil and upon their return the door was shut and they were not allowed in to disturb the ceremony with their tardiness. They were shut out.

Church vitality is much like lamp oil. Vitality is that which is given to us by the Holy Spirit that allows us to be a light in the darkness. What would our church be if we were not a light in the darkness? In what ways have we let our light go out for want of oil?

Will we miss out, have we missed out, on the presence of Jesus in our midst because we aren't prepared? Because we don't have the vitality as a church to participate in the Great Wedding Feast? That being, Jesus' reconciliation of the world to himself?

William Barclay gives us two thoughts on this parable. The first is that there are certain things that cannot be obtained at the last minute. Just as the bridesmaids were not prepared and were shut out, so might we be if we are not spiritually preparing our own hearts and contributing to the faith life of our church. Vitality is not something that one picks up in a day. Ask anyone who has ever recovered from a difficult surgery. Even if we remember the old strength of our limbs we have to slowly work up to our old activities or we are libel to hurt ourselves and undo the healing we have experienced. In time things grow and blossom and so vitality increases.

Vitality does not increase on its own, however. This is the hard work that each of us must engage in. In what ways are you growing in your faith? How are you seeking to put God first in your life? Have you challenged yourself? Have you learned something new about God? Are you engaged in study? Are you bravely and generously giving your time to leadership of the church? The vital growth of our church is the aggregate of the personal growth of our members.

Secondly, there are things that cannot be borrowed. Five foolish bridesmaids needed oil. Five wise bridesmaids had enough for their own lamps. The Foolish had not taken responsibility for their role as being lights in the darkness. We, as a church, cannot 'borrow oil' from our denomination, our community, or from the latest and greatest bible study in order to become vital. It is up to us to engage in what God is calling us to do here, as a church.

In the same way, as individuals, we cannot 'borrow oil' from our family, our spouse, or our friends. We cannot borrow oil from our pastors, our deacons or other members of our church. God is calling you into a relationship with God and there are so many good things that you could be apart of. Now is the time to fill your lamps. Now is the time to shine your light. Our source of the oil of faith is Jesus Christ. And like a child we demand to be allowed to 'do it ourselves' ignorant of the fact that faith development is something that only Jesus can do in us. This might take some time, so start now.

Be ready! Be Vital! The Bridegroom is coming and what a joy that will be! Let us be a vital church to the Glory of God.

## "Times, They Are a Changing" by Pastor Lindsey Carnes

Before a church calls it's next pastor, the congregation and Interim Pastor are expected to complete a Mission Study. A major aspect of the Mission Study is to research Census data, demographics and the community. Changes in the community and demographics may shape a congregation's future ministries, may point out ways that the church mirrors or doesn't match their community, and may help the congregation understand its own community better. Fenton began this work before calling its new pastors, but did not complete a full Mission Study, such as the one pastor Lindsey is leading at Trinity United in Flint.

Ask anyone in Fenton how the city has changed, and you'll get a lot of opinions, good and bad. While most are in agreement that the urban redevelopment of the 1970s was not favorable, there is still a wide range of opinions on the newer developments. Some people bemoan the increased construction of new houses in the city and on the lakes, while others like having more neighbors. Some will complain about the increased traffic in town, and others enjoy the economic benefits of the increased number of people that travel to enjoy Fenton's businesses and restaurants. Some have issues with the millages for roads and schools, and others with or without kids appreciate how these amenities keep their house prices stable.

Some changes remain fairly predictable: the Michigan Governors have alternated between the Democrats and the Republicans since the 1940s. The Unions and the big automobile companies continue to have influence, even if you're not in the industry. And though it is still a small town, Fenton is not exempt from the effects of bigger city problems.

(Statistics gathered from 2000 and 2010 Census, US Census 2018 ACS 5-Year Survey, United Way ALICE report, and Fenton Area Schools data) Some of the demographics have changed very little in the last decade. Fenton is ethnically not very diverse: 95% Caucasian, 5.2% Hispanic, 1.15% African American, and 3% multi-racial. 55% of people are married (55% in Michigan and 55% is the U.S. average), and almost equally unmarried 53%. A greater number of Fenton area families (52%) are more likely to have children under 18 (compared to 41% MI and 43% U.S.).

The housing and economic crash of 2008 effected Fenton to a lesser degree than its surrounding cities. But as the Fenton homes have steadily regained their value, many Generation X'ers and Millenials priced out of the housing market. Home ownership was at 60% in 2017 and 40% of people rented. And depending on which statistics you look at, between 35-46% of Fenton Area Public School students are eligible for free or reduced lunch prices, the majority of whom are Caucasian.

Younger generations in Fenton and the surrounding cities and townships are increasingly becoming ethinically diverse, economically diverse, more highly educated, less likely to be married, while the older generations are more likely to be Caucasian, 1.5 times more women than men, in higher income brackets than younger generations, home owners, and living alone.

How has the Fenton area changed, beyond our own impressions and opinions? How have these changes impacted the vitality of our congregation? The 2020 Census data (featured above) will give us a new snapshot of how Fenton, Michigan, and the U.S. has changed in the last decade.

## MISSION AND STEWARDSHIP

### 2020 Shelter of Flint



The Shelter of Flint serves more than 1000 homeless adults and children every day! The average stay for their client is 37 days and they consistently report 90% in positive housing destinations. While they have many success stories, let us share just one:

After having difficulty finding suitable housing in Lansing and having a few homeless episodes, Angie returned to Flint to be near family. She came to the

Shelter of Flint with her 2-year-old son, Christopher, who has special needs. While at the shelter, her son made friends and gained the courage to begin walking. She was able to get help finding a house and received a care package of household items when leaving the shelter. Angle and her family have been in their house for over a year. Her son is in school and is walking all over the place. Angle is taking classes at MI Works and works from home as a part-time beautician.

"The shelter helps you move forward. They motivate you to get out of the situation you are in and not be in that situation again. Shelter of Flint rocks!" Angie

On February 22, 10 volunteers from our church went to serve at the Shelter of Flint. We organized their attic storage and washed/waxed their dining room floor. Our church family helped them make a difference in our world using our time, talents and treasure (we use some of mission budget to support their essential services).

The Shelter of Flint has several essential programs:

- They provide emergency shelter for the homeless.
- They provide transitional and permanent housing.
- They provide comprehensive housing placement services in Genesee County.
- They provide the Homeless Outreach program as a point of entry into services for Genesee County including street outreach, wrap around services that partner with other community agencies, and information and referrals for needed services.



## FINANCIAL CORNER

### What Do I Do If I Can't Afford to Pay My Taxes?

The most important advice we can offer folks who can't afford to pay taxes by the April deadline is this: Don't avoid the problem! You can't solve it by not filing or by hiding from the IRS. You must pay any taxes owed. Face the issue head on so you can get the mess cleaned up, then make sure you're never in that position again.

The good news is that it can be done if you just know where to start. Here's our four-step plan to help you dig out of your deep tax hole, plus some success stories of people who climbed out of their own.

#### Step 1: File by the April deadline, even if you can't afford to pay your taxes on time.

The penalty for not filing your taxes can be 10 times as much as the penalty for not paying, so make sure you file your return on time! As soon as possible, begin working with an experienced tax professional to fill out your forms. They may be able to find credits and deductions for you that will lower your taxes owed. And when you owe the IRS, every dollar counts! Not sure if you need a tax pro? Take our guiz to find out!

Don't let taxes stress you out. A tax pro is the way to go!

#### Step 2: Pay as much as you can when you file.

When David D. was hit with a \$14,000 tax bill, he didn't have much time to come up with the money. "My wife and I were expecting our first kid so we were trying to save up for that," David explained. Failing to pay the full amount by the deadline meant David would be charged penalties and interest on top of the \$14,000. Determined not to be in debt, he decided to sell one of his two cars—which was fully paid for—in order to cover the amount.

Not everyone has the option to sell a vehicle, but you probably have unused items, like clothes or old toys, that could easily be sold for extra cash. If you can't afford to pay your taxes, this is one instance when Dave recommends waiting until the deadline to file to give yourself as much time as possible to save up and earn extra money. Don't bother getting an extension. Taxes are due with or without a filing extension.

#### Step 3: Keep paying the taxes you owe even after you file.

You'll have 30-60 days before the IRS contacts you about the rest of your taxes owed. During that time, keep throwing every available dollar at the balance with the goal of paying it off before they ever contact you. If you can't afford to pay all your taxes by that time, the IRS will likely allow you to pay the rest in monthly installments.

Jennifer M. found the IRS easy to work with when she set up a payment plan. "They were flexible and willing to work with our specific situation. Basically they asked us what we could afford each month, and we went from there," she explained. Because of Dave's debt snowball approach, Jennifer said she was motivated to get rid of her tax debt as fast as possible. And she did, in less than a year!

#### Step 4: Correct the problem so you don't have an unaffordable tax bill again.

Work with your tax expert to make sure you're not stuck with taxes you can't afford again. That may mean setting aside profits from a side business or adjusting the withholding from your paychecks. Whatever the issue, a tax pro will be able to spot the problem and help you fix it going forward. Save time and reduce hassle by gathering the right paperwork the first time around. <u>Download your free tax preparation checklist</u>.

This isn't a situation to handle by yourself. You need a qualified tax expert to walk with you through this process. April N. realized this when she was left owing a couple thousand dollars in taxes after underestimating her income. ### Love & Logic Corner Handling a Bad Report Card by Dr. Charles Fay

A Bad Report Card: What To Do When Our Kids Bring One Home?

A bad report card often arrives with more than just Cs, Ds, or Fs. It also carries emotions that leave many parents experiencing frustration, anger, fear, guilt, and even shame. Fortunately, bad grades don't mean bad parents, a bad kid, or a bad future for that kid. Instead, they represent an opportunity for us to express our unconditional love and provide wise guidance. When these opportunities arise, remember the following:

#### Hand it back.

"Handing it back" means expressing empathy while reminding yourself that your child's report card is not your report card.

This might sound like, "Oh, I can't imagine how disappointing this must be for you. I love you."

#### Listen and remember that just a bit of loving silence is golden.

When we talk too much, we end up owning the problem. When we empathize, listen, and provide a pat on the back or a hug, we are less likely to make the problem worse. Allow your child to think about the issue for a day or two before beginning another discussion.

#### Ask, "What do you think you are going to do?"

This question is not just a question. It's also a clear statement of your belief in your child's ability to cope and to find solutions. It also communicates the message that, "Your grades are your grades. I'm here to help but I can't do this for you."

#### Offer some options for solving the problem.

"Some kids decide to \_\_\_\_\_." This is far more likely to enjoy eventual success than, "You should\_\_\_\_\_."

#### Focus on character over grades.

Remember that we can't make our kids into great students, but we can make our home great places to learn important values like honesty, love for others, grit, and delayed gratification.

When we resist the temptation to allow our own fears and frustrations to take over—and instead place most of our emphasis on character—we dramatically increase the odds that our child will enjoy life-long success.

# 40 DAYS OF LENT ACTIVITIES FOR Families

- 1. Make a Lenten countdown calendar. You can color in or put a sticker on each day as it passes.
- 2. Start a jelly bean jar for sacrifices and good deeds.
- 3. Pray for someone.
- 4. Read an Easter book.
- 5. Help plan some Friday lunches and dinners with no meat.
- 6. Color something purple and talk about why purple is used during lent.
- 7. Do something to help the earth.
- 8. Make a list of things you are thankful for. Thank God for everything on the list.
- 9. Write a card or mote for someone you love.
- 10. Give up sweets for the day.
- 11. Read the story of the Last Supper and prepare a meal or snack together.
- 12. Decorate a cross. Let the kids take some liberty with this. They can color the cross, create one out of sticks, mold one out of clay. Let them decide.
- 13. Learn a new prayer. A children's prayer book can help or you can look up a simple prayer online.
- 14. Smile at everyone you see today.
- 15. Give up television for the day.
- 16. Make an egg carton empty tomb.
- 17. Dye Easter eggs. Talk about how eggs symbolize the resurrection of Jesus and new life.
- 18. Write down ways you can be a good friend.
- 19. Do something to help out around the house.
- 20. Fill a bag or box with toys to donate to kids in need.
- 21. Do a chore without being asked.
- 22. Tell someone you love them.
- 23. Bake pretzels as a symbol of arms crossed in prayer.
- 24. Give pennies for good behavior and help kids save them in a special collection jar for church.
- 25 Make a prayer chain out of 40 strips of paper with something/someone special to pray for on each one.
- 26. Plant a seed and watch it grow.
- 27. Bake resurrection rolls.
- 28. Exemplify sacrifice by giving up something as a family, such as candy or technology time
- 29. Brainstorm ways to be more like Jesus and write them on a poster where kids will see it every day.
- 30. Make "stained glass" crosses to decorate windows, such as thes

## WORSHIP SCHEDULE FOR MARCH

The month of March brings us into the season of Lent. It is during this time that we reflect on Jesus' sacrifice for us and traditionally discipline ourselves so that we might prepare for the celebration of Easter. Lent is a time that we reorient our lives toward the life of resurrection that Easter provides us. Therefore, Lent is not a season of somber deprivation as much as it is a joyful reliance on the strength of Christ in us and for us. Rather than living in our own power, let us live into the resurrection, enjoy God and discover God's work in us

**March 1st, 1st Sunday in Lent, Communion Sunday -** Robbie Carnes preaching, "Living the Resurrection: Drawing Life from Jesus; Romans 11:17-25, The agricultural image of grafting is insightful as we think about how Jesus includes us into his life. A grafted branch does not bring anything to the root, but the root provides all of the sustenance and life so that the grafted branch can bear fruit. In the same way, we as gentiles, sinners, addicts, and outsiders are grafted into the life of Christ and are giving life in order to bear fruit. This can not happen under our own strength, but is a gift from God.

**March 8th, 2nd Sunday of Lent and Daylight Savings -** Lindsey Carnes preaching, "Living the Resurrection: Forgiven and Forgiving"; Luke 7:36-50. This story recounts a woman who reveres Jesus because she was forgiven. Jesus equates the level of one's acknowledgement of forgiveness to one's ability to love. It would seem that the more we experience Jesus' forgiveness and our need for that forgiveness the more that we grow the capacity for love. In what ways can we leverage this effect in order to love Jesus and other people more?

**March 15th, 3rd Sunday of Lent & Potatoe Bake -** Robbie Carnes preaching, "Living the Resurrection: Loved and Loving"; 1 John 4:11-20. We love because he first loved us. Love is an instigating virtue. It leavens every other virtue, giving it purpose and focus and it demands a response. Jesus loves us with a great love. Amazingly enough, as we seek to respond to Jesus' love for us by loving him and other people, we learn more about Jesus' love for us. The self-revelation of Jesus is in the acts of love of Jesus' church, through worship, mission and mercy.

**March 22th, 4th Sunday of Lent -** Robbie Carnes Preaching, "Living the Resurrection: Given Peace, Being Peace (Makers)"; John 14:27; Matthew 5:9, Whatever warfare that we have engaged with God in is over at the cross. There is no more need for raving or conniving, Jesus offers us peace and reconciling. If we are to accept these things from our Savior and deny them to our neighbors and enemies, we may find that we have not yet truly accepted them from Jesus. The accepting and granting of peace go hand in hand.

**March 29th, 5th Sunday of Lent** - Robbie Carnes preaching, "Living the Resurrection, Pressed to Give"; 2 Corinthians 4:1-12, Incarnational and sacrificial living are difficult and uncomfortable, yet they are the clearest way that we can live like Jesus and reveal the Gospel to the world. Just like olives that are the good fruit of the grafted branches and are pressed and crushed to make good oil, we should be looking for ways that Jesus is calling us to be pressed and crushed so that the Gospel is proclaimed in our living are a stark contrast to the faithfulness of Christ.

# HOLY WEEK

Holy Week is the most important week in the Church year! It is a time when we celebrate in a special way the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. We remember his actions, reflect on his messages, and recommit to living as his disciples in the world today.

**Palm Sunday, April 5:** Sunday before Easter, when the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem is celebrated. It originated in the late 3rd or 4th Century in the Jerusalem Church, as they read scriptures or sang hymns as they stopped at numerous holy sites. In the 6th and 7th Century, a ritual blessing of the palms was added, and in the 8th Century a morning procession was celebrated in the Western Church. Many Palm Sunday traditions remain the same as those celebrated in the 10th Century, where many people take palms home and place them in their houses or make palm crosses.

**Seder Dinner - Tuesday April 7th, 6:30 pm:** Come and enjoy wonderful food and fellowship as we share a meal that has been celebrated for over 3,000 years. We will learn how the Last Supper that Jesus shared with his disciples is similar to the Seder meal, and enrich our understanding about our celebration of commu-nion and fellowship with other believers. Cost: \$15 for adults, \$10 for children 12 and under.

This includes a dinner of traditional Jewish dishes, sampling of symbolic Passover foods, as well as a wonderful program explaining the Seder Meal. Traditionally 4 glasses of wine/juice are consumed during the meal. Tickets will be available through March 18th after worship or you can contact; the church office 810-629-7801 or Julie Grams Julie at jmgrams12@gmail.com.

**Maundy Thursday, April 9:** Commemorates the foot washing and Last Supper of Jesus with the Apostles. Jesus gathered to eat the Passover feast in the evening, so this service is typically held in the evening with Communion. The English word "maundy" comes from the Latin "mandatum" or mandate/ commandment from Jesus' words "A new commandment I give to you: that you love one another as I have loved you."



**Good Friday, April 10:** It may seem odd that people celebrate the day Jesus was crucified as "good." What Jesus went through being whipped, beaten, mocked and killed in a violent way were not good. What Christ accomplished for us is victory over death, by demonstrating God's love for us by dying in our place. Good Friday commemorates Jesus' crucifixion and three days in the grave before his resurrection. The sanctuary is stripped of all ornamentation and colored banners and often replaced with black.

**Easter Sunday, April 12:** Commemorates the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, and God's victory over death! Easter Sunday is something we should celebrate every day of our lives, not just once a year, but we take this special day to recognize God's great gift of eternal life for us. Traditions vary in each denomination and culture, but they call attention to new life in Christ and the death of our old selves and rebirth into new life.


