


PASTOR'S LETTER

What is the Gospel

hat is the Gospel? It is easy to think that discipleship is the institutional function of passing on theological (what we know about God) and ecclesiastical (how we run the church) information so that the Church can consistently be doing quality ministry and be a strong spiritual community throughout the generations. While this is important, if we seek to make disciples of our church or tradition, the answer to the question, "What is the Gospel?" becomes, "Support the church!" Whereas, if we seek to make disciples of Jesus the answer to that question becomes a journey for an eternity, the mustard seed of faith, the pearl of great price.

The easiest answer to the question, "What is the Gospel?" is that God saves sinners. At first that might seem trite, however unpacking this little phrase gets us surprising places. First, the Gospel is something that God does, not us. [Romans 5:8 But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us]. If the Gospel is God's instigation and all we need to do is accept God's faithful goodness to us through Jesus, then the Gospel means freedom. [Galatians 5:1 For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery]. Freedom from what? From our own efforts to be acceptable.

From our own strength to do good. From our limited capacity for wisdom and vision and imagination. We are free from striving in our own power and we learn to rely on God's strength.

Second, if the Gospel is about God saving us, then we must have something to be saved from. For some of us, this can or has meant a drastic change in our lives. Where we were once one thing, we have now become something entirely different. Jesus has given us a way to become new. [2] Corinthians 5:16 From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!] There are many different images of what that could mean in our individual lives. We are freed from the slavery of the flesh into the life of the Spirit. We are accepted into the people of God and given a new citizen in God's Kingdom. We are adopted into God's family whereas we once where orphans. Through the community of faith and the power of the Spirit we can be freed from bitterness, grief, guilt, and bad habits and truly experience a new and meaningful life.


Thirdly, the Gospel is about God saving sinners and sinners mean us.

Romans 3:23-24 all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus]. This means all of us are guilty of wrong doing toward God, ourselves and others. Through Jesus, God saves us from the spiritual guilt of our sin and teaches how we might live ethically with each other. However, we have all sinned against each other and it accumulates tragically throughout history, compounding year after year and we, as individuals act against each other without recognizing the harm that is done. We sin against each other ignorantly and even our acts of mercy and our systems of benevolence can become tools of pain and injury. Not only do our actions need to be transformed, our entire world needs to be renewed, and Jesus promises to do it. [Revelation 21:5 And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true."]

I would hope that this is a compelling explanation of what the Gospel is. However, it is nothing better than a good story unless it is tied to our own story. What does this mean to you? What freedom have you found in Christ? From what have you been saved? In what ways do you hope in the future, present and eternal?

When we begin to answer these questions, through prayer and intentional time with Jesus; through worship and Bible study, we begin to become disciples of Jesus. When we begin to grasp how Jesus loves us, we can begin to love others as Jesus loves them, sharing with them the goodness of God.

John 13:34-35 I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."


More information will follow regarding this and I hope that you might take advantage of this faithful fellowship opportunity.

"You are the Son of the Living God"

Who is Jesus? Who do you say he is? Let me tell you some of the answers I've heard or read. Jesus is my personal Lord and Savior. The Son of God. God incarnate. He's my life, the song I sing, my everything. Buddy, brother, friend, homeboy. Rock, comforter, coach. Teacher. Example. The copilot next to me. The list could go on and on.

At some point or another we've probably all been told who Jesus is. Maybe you heard it from pastors, teachers, parents, friends, or prayer groups. Maybe you read it in books, Sunday school lessons, or on bumper stickers. Maybe you saw it on Facebook, read it on the internet, or heard it in a song. Some of the answers may have been helpful. Some were not. Some were just plain silly and some may have even been hurtful and destructive. Regardless, the question remains. Who is Jesus? Who do you say he is?

By now most of you know me well enough to know that I don't intend to answer that question for you. I can't. Each of us must answer it for ourselves. It is not, however, a theology or Bible exam. If anything, it is an examination of our own lives.

I don't think Jesus is asking us to just parrot back the answers we've heard or read. Maybe that's why he pushes the disciples to move from what they are hearing around them – John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah, or one of the prophets – to what they are hearing within themselves. "But who do you say that I am?"

This is not an easy question. I wonder if we sometimes too readily accept and settle for "Sunday Jesus" answers. You know, the easy, feel good, sentimental ones. The problem is life isn't always easy, feel good, or sentimental. It's one thing to say who Jesus is on a Sunday morning, in relative safety and comfort. It's a very different thing to say who he is outside of that. The question is never merely academic or abstract. It always has a context. Here's what I mean.

- Who do we say Jesus is following the death of George Floyd and the increasing racial tensions in our country?
- Who do we say Jesus is this week when prominent female human rights leaders and activists are murdered in the Philippines and Iraq, amidst rapes in India that occur every 16 seconds, and in the face of continuing persecutions and hostage taking by the Islamic State in Nigeria?
- Who do we say Jesus is as COVID spreads, as people in our town still don't have access to clean water, live amidst domestic violence, or work for a wage that cannot support a family?
- Who do we say Jesus is when a loved one dies, the doctor gives news we did not want to hear, and our life seems to be falling apart?
- Who do we say Jesus is when we are faced with decisions that have no easy answers, when the night is dark and the storms of life overwhelm us, when faithfulness means risking it all and taking a stand against a louder and seemingly more powerful majority?

Using the context of these few examples, what does it mean to say Jesus is my personal Lord and Savior, my example, or my brother and friend? What does it mean to say Jesus is my life, the song I sing, or my teacher?

Here's my point. Who we say Jesus is has everything to do with who and how we are and will be. In some ways our answer says as much or more about us than Jesus. It reveals how we live and what we stand up for. It guides our decisions, and determines the actions we take and the words we speak. It describes the expectations and demands we place on Jesus. It discloses the depth of our motivation for and commitment to following him, a motivation and commitment that will be challenged by next week's gospel lesson in which Jesus invites us to take up our cross and die with him.

Jesus' question isn't so much about getting the right answer as it is about witnessing and testifying to God's life, love, and presence in our lives and the world. It is less about our intellect and more about our heart. It is grounded in love more than understanding. It moves us from simply knowing about Jesus to knowing him.

In some sense there is no once and for all, finally and forever, answer. We are always living into the question. Who Jesus was when I was baptized at 16 is different from who he was when I was in my 30s or who he is for me today. Hopefully, who he is for me next year will be different from who he is today. It's not that Jesus has changed. I have. We are constantly engaging his question and in so doing we not only discover Jesus anew, we discover ourselves anew.

Sometimes we discover a disconnect between the "Sunday Jesus" about whom we sing and talk for an hour, and the life we live the other 167 hours of our week. Our words and actions don't align. There is no congruity or integrity. I don't say that as a judgment about anyone but in acknowledgement of just how difficult it can be to recognize and live the truth that Jesus is "the Messiah, the Son of the living God."

More than once I have fallen into the gap between my "Sunday Jesus" kind of answers and the circumstances of my life and world. Sometimes my answers were too simple, too small, too easy. They were no match for the complexities of life and the pain of the world. Other times my life has not reflected what I said about who Jesus is. Sometimes I kept quiet when I should have spoken up. Other times I was passive when I should have done something. Whenever I fell into that gap it has usually been because I was trying to play it safe. That almost never works.

There is nothing safe about the question Jesus poses. How could there be? There is nothing safe about Jesus or the life to which he calls us.

Jesus' life and presence among us call into question everything about our lives, our world, the status quo, and business as usual. That's why we ought not answer his question too quickly, too glibly, or with too much certainty. It's not a question to be figured out as much as it is a question to be lived.

World Communion Sunday October 4th




"All who eat and drink without discerning the body, eat and drink judgment against themselves." (I Cor. 11:29)

Congregations of many denominations extend the peace of Christ with a blessing during their service. "The peace of Christ be with you (and also with you)." It is a blessing offered and a blessing returned in kind. The peace of Christ is part of what our faith offers to us. Extending the peace of Christ is part of an active, engaged faith—a witness to what it means for us to be building the household of God.

In God's house, there are people of every background. In God's house, there are people of every race, age and gender. In God's house, people who are different from each other in almost every way live together and seek ways to bring about Christ's peace in every part of our lives. We speak out and claim the truth in Second

Thessalonians, "May the Lord of peace himself give you peace at all times in all ways." In our church gatherings, we practice offering Christ's peace, trusting that the blessing offered will also be returned.

On World Communion Sunday, we celebrate that Christ's peace extends throughout all creation. We celebrate that we are all together at the table, in God's house. We celebrate that we are offered what we need to continue the work of building the household of God with active peacemakers here at home and around the world.

25 percent of the gifts received will stay right here at the church to build God's house. Twenty-five percent will support regional efforts in our mid councils, and 50 percent will go the Presbyterian Mission Agency for its ministries of education and partnership with active peacemakers all around the world.


Equal Exchange

JESUS CALLS US

This year the Mission and Stewardship Committee has chosen the hymn, "Jesus Calls Us O'er the Tumult' as the theme of the 2021 Stewardship Campaign. If you are not already familiar with this hymn we use it throughout the month of October in various ways and ponder together how Jesus is calling us in our present circumstances.

This hymn was written in 1852 by Cecil Frances Humphreys Alexander, a talented poet and the wife of an Anglican Clergyman.

"Perhaps she was thinking of the contradictions inherent in being a comfortable Christian when she penned the verses to "Jesus Calls Us" one autumn evening in 1852. Her husband had spent the day writing his sermon for Saint Andrew's Sunday. Over dinner they discussed the scripture Matthew 4: 18-20, in which Jesus called out "Follow me!" to two brothers fishing in the Sea of Galilee. At once, Andrew (the "First-Called") and Simon Peter (the "Rock") dropped their nets and followed Jesus. Inspired by this conversation, Mrs. Alexander wrote this hymn of discipleship. It was read to the congregation that Sunday following the sermon.

In the 1850's, Ireland was recovering from a period of mass starvation caused by the potato famines of 1845-1849. Over a million people had died and another million had fled the country.

Mrs. Alexander made frequent visits to those who were still struggling to survive. She traveled the soggy moorlands, bringing food, clothing, and medical supplies to farm families. Once, she went every day for six weeks to tend a woman's infected foot.

She also gave away the money she made from her hymn and poetry collections, once to fund a school for deaf children, another time to the Derry Home for Fallen Women...

...Jesus calls us. Us? Yes! We are the ones called from our obsession with "the vain world's golden store." Jesus is motioning to us, calling us to follow him, demanding, "Christian, love me more!" We hear his plea, "Love me more than these!" whether we're at work or taking our ease with our feet up. But are we ready? Isn't this a little extreme? Can we be honest?

In the 21st century, it's easy to feel bewildered by the "tumult of our life's wild, restless sea." On the evening news, we are stunned at the consequences of consumerism gone wild. The "vain world's golden store" got us but good. We struggle to simplify the way we live, let go of our trinkets and toys, reevaluate our relationship with the trappings of the good life. Still, Jesus whispers in our ears, "Christian, love me more than these." (https://askherabouthymn.com/what-hymnof-discipleship-challenges-consumerism/)

Even in the tumult of COVID, an Election Year and society turmoil, Jesus calls us. The Mission and Stewardship Committee would like you to consider in what way Jesus maybe calling you? To serve the world, to support your church to love your neighbor? In the month of October you will be receiving a Pledge Card in the mail. Would you please prayerfully consider how Jesus might be calling you to support Fenton First Presbyterian Church? Let us pray together that all of us might hear Jesus' voice and be faithful to the call.



The questions are based on the theme of the week, either Grow, Share, Serve, and Community. The most important part of the journey is engaging in Fellowship and Spiritual discussion.







3 Powerful Reminders to Help Parents Manage this School Year

How are you doing these days?

Okay, that was a loaded question.

Here we are in September, facing the most unprecedented school year of all time, and I'm asking how you're doing. Feel free to scream, cry, or laugh in response. You won't be alone.

The majority of parents I talk to are overwhelmed. When I ask friends how they're doing, I hear comments like:

"I hope I made the right choice keeping her home."

"At least you were given a choice!"

"I can't make plans to return to work because I don't know when or if my kids will go back to school full-time."

"My first-grader can't figure out anything on his own and my fourth-grader can't handle the boredom."

"I've lost precious hours I'd normally spend being productive—now I'm just sitting and supervising."

We're working, parenting, teaching, cooking, and restless in bed when we should be sleeping. After all, when else do we have time to think?

Well, fellow parents, today you are inforatreat. Knowing we all need some encouragement to power through, we"ve reached out to Mary Van Geffen, a Certified Simplicity Parenting Counselor & Professional Co-Active Coach.

She's an advocate for grown-ups and right

now, we really need one. I know I took so much away from our conversation—and I hope you will too!

3 Powerful Reminders to Help Parents Manage this School Year

When it comes to parenting—and schooling—during a pandemic, Mary and I discussed a few strategies for easing the worried parent's mind:

1. Create a to-don't list. In a time where a parent's day is filled to the brim with obligations, consider making a list of anti-obligations. In other words: decide what you won't do.

Mary suggests letting go of comparison, saying, "Everyone is in this storm, but people are living in vastly different boats." And she's right. Some of us have flexible work schedules, some of us don't. Your neighbor might be managing one child's education while you're barely balancing four. And each of us—parents, teachers, and kids alike—bring to the table a unique blend of personality and aptitude.

Comparison gets us nowhere, so let's add it to the won't do, don't do list!

Also on Mary's anti-obligations list? Taking on the responsibility of your child's education. (Brace yourself because this next part might make you feel a bit sweaty).

She says, "Once we help students get fed, get online, and into their Zoom classroom, it's time to walk out of the room and let the chips fall a bit. If you need to stay, shut thine mouth. Grin and bear as much as you can. The teacher will reach out if there's a problem."

Sweaty, yes, but aren't we also breathing a sigh of relief?

Me? I'm no longer responding to shouts for help from across the house. As long as those little legs work, I'm expecting them to do their job and carry my kids to me, where they can ask for what they need in a calm, kind voice.

What will you add to your 2020 Schooling To-Don't List?

2. Find ease in cultivating a positive, peaceful home. Mary acknowledges right away—and we should too—that on-screen schooling puts young children in a learning environment that's just not developmentally appropriate.

Translation: little ones need to move and interact and when they don't, they struggle to learn. This is the reality you're swimming in five days a week if your kids are learning at home.

You'll help them learn best not by worrying so much about school, but by inserting yourself into the hours outside of school. Mary refers to this as the superpowers of CONNECTION and RHYTHM.

She explains, "Connection looks like you, self-regulated, giving your full presence a few times throughout the day—playfulness, a smile on your face, you delighting in them." Be careful, though, not to consider this another obligation. Connection, Mary says, can be as simple as, "you observing and appreciating what they're doing."

Rhythm works as an extension, by adding reliable moments of connection throughout the day's transitions. "It looks like alternating between two different predictable states of doing or being. Between effort and relaxation, small motor skills and large motor skills, stillness and movement, quiet and loud, inside and outside, together and alone, structured and self-directed," says Mary.

She likens rhythm to breathing—inhale and exhale—as a way to calm the body. You add to that calm by balancing out an otherwise screen-filled day. It can be easy, too. You might "have a set menu and time for snacks or say, 'We always play tag together during your first break," says Mary.

Remember to add rhythm to your own day as well. I take a long walk each morning while my husband feeds our boys breakfast. I listen to a podcast or call my mom and come back with my legs tingling from the uphill climb and my mind ready to tackle the day ahead at home. Rhythm at its finest.

3. Remember: God is for your family. When it comes to parenting through a pandemic, we're all newbies. Mary encourages us to be gentle with ourselves.

She says, "There's no proven script. No one has done this before. This is a Moses Moment—a moment of leading your family through something for which you have no experience."

Mary goes on: "When Moses led the Israelites out of slavery from Egypt, he had never been on that journey before. He wasn't equipped. It was God who showed up big time to part the Red Sea and rain down food in the desert. You just stay faithful to your values and to your belief that God is for your family and He'll show up in the midst of it all."

We can take comfort and rest in the knowledge that God is on our side.


We may not totally understand what's going on today and we sure don't know what will happen tomorrow, but He does. And Mary reminds me, as I'm working hard to be a good parent, that He's a good Father.

We understand that many families have no idea what lies ahead this school year. You're

off to a start (whatever that looks like for you) and we pray it's going as well as it can. But we know we're all going to face challenges we've never faced before this year. So we want to pray this prayer together over the rest of this school year. Pray it daily and trust God to remind you in this Moses Moment that He is for you and your kids—He is present and able to provide all that you need.

A Prayer for this Messy School Year

Dear God, Thank You for being on our side. Thank You for being with us in the middle of this messy school year. God, we trust you'll carry our fears, frustrations, stress, and questions as we walk the unpaved road ahead, together. Holy Spirit, help us to see clearly what is best for our family, according to Your will. And as we navigate our unique path, remind us to not lose sight of those around us that may be struggling in the same or different ways. May we shine your light and love no matter what difficulties we face every day. In Jesus' Name, Amen.



"A Child's 10 Commandments"

- **1. Thou shalt accept my youthfulness.** I need tender direction and loving leadership. Constant criticism and raised eyebrows make me feel foolish and inadequate.
- **2. Thou shalt accept my imperfections.** Please don't expect perfection whenever you assign a task to me. I really do learn by my mistakes.
- **3. Thou shalt accept my limitations.** My hands are small and sometimes I seem awkward and clumsy. Please be patient with me.
- **4. Thou shalt show me the way to go.** When I show off, I'm really asking for affirmation and reassurance. Could you please give me gentle guidance so my behavior doesn't become my attitude?
- **5. Thou shalt welcome me.** If I'm new to your class, please take the time to explain the routine and show the other children that you're glad to see me (even if you thought your class was big enough already).
- **6. Thou shalt expect the best from me.** Please don't have preconceived ideas about me. I have the tendency to live up to your expectations. Expect me to behave appropriately.
- **7. Thou shalt make the Word of God come to life for me.** Find creative ways to teach me about the power of God, the ministry of Jesus, and all of God's Word.
- **8. Thou shalt help me know and do what's right.** Nobody needs to show me how to sin (it comes naturally), but somebody please care enough to lovingly discipline me when I act inappropriately.
- **9. Honor my father and mother with good communication. T**alking to my parents could help you discover my fears, my joys, my problems, my talents, my weaknesses, and my strengths.
- **10. Thou shalt pray for me.** You know, you may be the only person in the whole world who talks to God about me. I need you to ask God to help me.


