PASTOR'S LETTER

How Can We Be Thankful

he steadfast love of the Lord endures forever. This is a phrase that is repeated throughout the Psalms and other parts of the Old Testament. It seems to have been frequently used as lyrics to worship songs in the ancient temple not unlike our use of songs like 'Amazing Grace' and 'How Great Thou Art'. As the offerings were presented they sang, "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good, for his steadfast love endures forever." Just like those ancient worshippers, we are called to be thankful to God because of his great love to us.

Are you able to do that? Can you honestly be thankful to God right now? Has God been steadfast in your life?

I challenge you to consider these questions carefully. As people try to celebrate Thanksgiving this month, it might be difficult to be thankful. Nine months of pandemic with all of the accompanying restrictions and tragedies have left us depleted. Cantankerous politics have left us numbly cynical. An uncertain future has left us with scant hope.

Aisha Ahmad, a professor at the University of Toronto and disaster zone expert, writes about a 'six month wall' that she routinely experiences as she engages with sustained crisis around the world. She describes a pattern of a demoralizing lack of physical and emotional energy and general malaise that happens after about 6 months of any sustained disaster experience. She also speaks about how this 'wall' is temporary and part of a natural human cycle. (https://pbs.twimg.com/media/EixfhEmXsAQtSLO?format=jpg&name=4096x4096)

This cycle that she describes from her personal experiences is similar to the classic 'Phases of Disaster' (https://www. samhsa.gov/dtac/recovering-disasters/phasesdisaster). A series of warnings and threats culminate in an Impact Event which most of us respond heroically to with a burst of energy and innovation, just like in the movies. However, unlike the movies there are no credits to roll and we fall into disillusionment and struggle to put the pieces back together. While these phases are easily applied to a local disaster, it is clear that Aisha Ahmad's 'six month wall' aptly describes the experience of many of us.

If God's love endures forever how do we give thanks in the midst of 'sustained disaster conditions' as Aisha Ahmad describes it? Her suggestions to overcome the wall are simple. Accept your fatigue. Recognize that it is temporary. Find healthy and constructive 'escapes' and self-care practices, including good books, exercise,

support groups and sourdough bread. And finally, have hope in the future that this too shall pass. It is remarkable to me that her advice is very much like Jesus'.

Jesus calls us to find rest in him and not be constantly running on empty. Slowing down, even at the holidays, is healthy and holy. Matthew 11:28-30 "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

There is much to do. Not just preparing for the holidays, but also simply surviving isolation, medical challenges, online schooling, etc... We need spiritual rest and it is ok to retreat to find it in prayer. "Unless you are in the middle of performing open-heart surgery on a patient, it is unlikely that taking a 30-minute walk [or a 30 minute time of quiet prayer] is going to kill anyone," Ahmad writes. Luke 5:15-16 But now more than ever the word about Jesus spread abroad; many crowds would gather to hear him and to be cured of their diseases. But he would withdraw to deserted places and pray.

Being aware of our holistic needs is crucial in sustaining ourselves through the 'six month wall' and beyond. Our spiritual needs are so easily forgotten amidst the chaos of our lives. Yet it is through Jesus that we are renewed. John 15:4 Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me."

As Christians we should be people who abound in Hope. 2 Corinthians 4:16-18 "So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal."

So I ask again, can you be thankful to God for his enduring love right now? Getting our perspective on who we are in the midst of disaster and crisis is helpful. Gaining perspective on who God is in the midst of disaster and crisis, and maybe even more importantly where God is, is transformational. God's steadfast love does endure forever! Thank God for that!



"Never Ours To Begin With"

You've probably seen some video of parents at sporting events (mostly football games) getting way too bent out of shape over a game. It's shocking to us. We'd never act that way. But it's not meaningless to them. See, we are capable of the same stupidity that drives them to start fighting with referees or coaches or come out onto the field to hurt a kid that they felt wronged their child.

I know I'm capable of it and you are too. But why do we act that way? Because we are selfish. Because think that what we have belongs to us. Because we think that what we have, we have worked for. We think that we are entitled. Jesus is pointing out that this is the problem of the leaders. religious probably trickled down to some others as well.

Jesus tells a parable about the wicked

tenants in Matthew 21:33-46. The problem came when the tenants came in and trashed the place, thinking that it was theirs. I do believe that the Pharisees, at least in the beginning, were motivated by their love of God. But, somewhere along the way, they lost sight of putting him first and instead began to serve themselves.

People of God... none of this stuff is ours. We are merely stewards in the vineyard...not the

owners. What you have is never your own. It is borrowed, and you are only the tenant there to manage it as best as possible before giving it back. But there is a key difference, and the key difference is this...believe it or not, God desires to order our lives, to make it manageable, even prosperous if we will trust him. If we put him first, these other things take on a far different perspective. God

gives us a certain order to our lives if we are willing to be obedient, faithful stewards of the gifts he has given us. When we recognize that what we have is not ours in the first place, it frees us from having to constantly try and control and worry about everything, it allows God to be God...the master of the vineyard.

When we joined the Church we promised God that we would be loyal and uphold it by our prayers, our presence, our gifts,

and our service. And the better we are at being good stewards by our prayers, our presence, our gifts and our service...the more possible it is for us to be able to reach the world with what is our primary stewardship—the most valued treasure of all—something we possess through the gift of faith—that is the lifechanging gospel of Jesus Christ.

And we must be careful that we don't reject him, like those in the parable of the vineyard,



forgetting these blessings—failing to count them and consequently turn against God and his representatives. The Old Testament prophets, the apostolic writers of the New Testament, our pastors, teachers and Sunday school teachers, and our Christian parents and grandparents, our Elders and Deacons, serve as leaders who challenge and guide us. How many times do they ask for volunteers and we wait for someone else to raise their hand and volunteer first? How many times are we unwilling to rework our schedule to make time for God and service to others? How many times are we asked to try something different and criticize

People of God, that is what God is asking of us to be good tenants. God is asking us to listen to the representatives he's sent to pass on messages. When we hear God calling us to respond, when Christ is leading us in the way in loving others, when the Holy Spirit calls you to use your time, talents, and treasure, don't be like the tenants who shoot and mistreat the messenger. Say yes. The Lord has been waiting since the beginning of time to see humanity respond positively to the call on their lives. Now that call has been passed to us. How will you respond?

Red Cross Blood Drive

"Every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood. It is essential for surgeries, cancer treatment, chronic illnesses, and traumatic injuries. Whether a patient receives whole blood, red cells, platelets or plasma, this lifesaving care starts with one person making a generous donation. One donation can potentially save up to 3 lives. Every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood." Quote from the Red Cross

We had another very successful blood drive and our first during the COVID pandemic. We had a goal to collect 31 pints of blood and we collected 36. We want to thank the people who donated the blood, the Boy Scouts for assisting in packing up the equipment, and the members who hosted the drive on Monday, October 26. We are grateful that we can host such an important life-preserving event for our community! In addition, we use some of our local mission budget to support the Red Cross programs.

CROP WALK UPDATE

On Sunday, October 4, our church had over 20 volunteers to support this year's CROP Walk. Each church had their own walk route due to the pandemic. But we raised over \$1350 and the Fenton community raised over \$14,850! Great result for a very difficult year when so many are facing difficult and constant changes!!

25% of the money raised stays in our community and is split between 3 great causes:

- 1/3 goes to St. Judes' school lunch program which has served over 17,000 meals
- 1/3 goes to the Fenton UMC Food Bank
- 1/3 goes to the FISH program in Linden

75% of the money raised goes to help end hunger around the world. Just a couple of examples:

- Venezuelan migrants living in Ecuador after they fled Venezuela's political crisis were provided food
- Food and hygiene supply baskets to 200 families in low-income neighborhoods in Ecuador's largest city, Guayaquil over the last 3 months. Each basket cost \$20 to prepare.

Together we can help end hunger in our community and around the world.






