

PASTOR'S LETTER

Ancient Arguments

Duringthereignof Roman Emperor Diocletian the Christian Church suffered greatly (A.D. 303). Socially and civilly, Christians were persecuted by the Empire most notably by the demand of church leaders to hand over their scriptures as a symbol of rejection of their faith and therefore avoid mistreatment by the state. With the death of the Emperor, the persecution of Christians ended, and Church leaders who initially succumbed to the pressure of the government repented their abandonment of the faith and took up their positions of leadership once again.

It was a time for the Christian Church to heal and recover, however a dispute soon erupted. A bishop was to be installed in the North African city of Carthage. This bishop was rejected by some Christians who simply chose their own bishop. The reason that they did this was an issue of purity. The fellow who ordained this new bishop of Carthage had been one of the church leaders who had abandoned his faith in order to avoid the wrath of the government just a generation before. This prior sin was grounds for rejecting the standing of the bishop's leadership and therefore the new bishop of Carthage was illegitimate. In short, any sacrament that the tainted priest performed wasn't effective and therefore forgiveness of sin and the ordination to the priesthood wasn't effective either. Logically, this resulted in a line of ineffective priests and impure churches.

While this dispute was convoluted with political and social complaints (and Emperor

Constantine was highly involved with the resolution), at the core it is about loyalty to the faith, purity of purpose, and the reconciliation of Christians who responded to persecution differently. It is clear that some Christians betrayed their faith and ordination vows to avoid oppression; it is also clear that some Christians suffered greatly because they held to their beliefs and practices in spite of persecution. While the church as a whole reconciled with each other and found effective means to be the church into the future, the sad truth is that a small schismatic church called the Donatists existed in North Africa until the Islamic Empire (A.D. 632).

What does this bit of history have to do with the modern church?

In our age of divisive politics and social media snark, Christians have a tremendous opportunity to witness to the Love, Mercy, and Goodness of God. How shall we do this? By being loving, merciful, and good, especially to other believers. The world would expect that the church would divide just like everything else. It is expected that social media memes and rants would raise our cackles and we would vehemently respond and visibly unfriend each other. The world expects us to abandon each other and redefine our social groups by our social and political values rather than our spiritual ones.

What would it look like if we didn't do that? What would it look like if we chose to remain connected even when we disagreed and didn't understand? What would it look like if we hung on to that which united us?

We might look like the church.



Augustine of Hippo wrote a powerful critique of the Donatists. Whereas they would justify their actions with concerns over purity, Augustine contends that the shattering of the fellowship of Christ to be the larger concern. Christ is the head of the church and therefore should supersede all others, politically or otherwise.

The Book of Order of the PCUSA says,

In Christ all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through Christ God reconciles all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of the cross (Col. 1:19-20). In Christ's name, therefore, the Church is sent out to bear witness to the good news of reconciliation with God, with others, and with all creation. In Christ the Church receives its truth and appeal, its holiness, and its unity.

Let us consider together how we might be church together, pursuing Christ, calling each other to faithfulness to Christ, and seeking the lost in the name of Christ.


It's Been Awhile






