# **PASTOR'S LETTER** The Kingdom of God: Already/Not Yet.

Jesus said the kingdom of God is a work in progress, but not yet finished. That's a lot like knitting (or many other things in life). The kingdom of God, Jesus said, is already a reality among us in this world, but it is not yet complete. It's something God is doing now, but it won't be completed until the end of time. We live between this present "already" and God's future "not yet." So Jesus taught us to pray for that future, saying "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven."

Jesus said that the kingdom of God is like a sower who went out to sow seed in his field. The seed fell on various types of ground, but the seed that fell into good soil brought forth much grain, yielding a hundredfold. Jesus said the kingdom of God is like yeast a woman mixed in with three measures of flour until all of the dough was leavened. Jesus said the kingdom of God is like a tiny mustard seed someone sowed in his field; when it grew, it became a large shrub, a tree, in which the birds of the air came to make their nests. Jesus was saying that the kingdom of God is already a reality, but not yet a completed reality. So Jesus taught us to pray for the kingdom: "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done." I can imagine Jesus saying, "The kingdom of God is like a woman who sat down to knit. She knitted stitch by stitch and row by row until she finished a shawl that gave warmth and comfort to one who needed it."

Stitch by stitch, row by row, already but not yet. Think about the unfinished things in your own life. Think about unresolved conflicts, unhealed pain from the past, uncertainties about relationships.

Think about the things that worry you like concerns you have for children or grandchildren. Think about the unknowns in your future. The unknown and unfinished things in our world are reasons Jesus taught us to pray, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done." He was saying to take our lives, the lives of those we love, and the well-being of this world, and place them in the hands of God trusting God for the future.

#### Stitch by Stitch

When we pray this prayer, we're praying that God's kingdom would come in and through us—that God would use us to be part of the healing of this world. We're asking that God enable us to help bring about God's kingdom of well-being for all God's people on earth.

Your kingdom come. You know, if we stop and think about it, praying for God's kingdom to come is an immense and awesome thing to try to wrap your head around. What we're praying for is nothing less than the kingdom of God to be manifest in our world. That is huge. That is powerful. That is...intense.

Part of what it means to embrace God's kingdom is to embrace hope that there is a future free of heartache and conflict and pain. And it's completely valid and very meaningful to pray in anticipation of that glorious event...after all, the very last prayer found in the Bible is "Come Lord Jesus!" But I think in our escapist culture... where we put such a high value on "getting away from it all," there's a danger that our Kingdom thinking becomes too narrow. We can become so enamored with what Christ will do when he returns, that we lose sight of what he's doing right now.

As a pastor friend of mine likes to say: "The kingdom of God is here but it is not yet fully here." One day it will be realized in all of its joy and peace and wonder and fulfillment. But even still, until that day, because of Jesus Christ, the kingdom is something we can taste and experience in this life. How does that happen? What does it mean to experience the kingdom of God in the here and now? To answer that we need to know what the kingdom is. See, we tend to think of kingdoms as nations...geographic and political entities, with defined boundaries and maybe a certain ethnicity associated with it. That's not what Jesus is talking about when he says "kingdom of God." For the Hebrew mind, the "kingdom of God" means, "God acting as king." It's not a place or a people...it's a dynamic experience of God's loving kingship and rule. And it results in a changed world.

We cannot bring about the kingdom by social works, elections or education humanitarian good or works. or environmental stewardship, or by the cultivation of the arts. This is where we must not be confused. Yes, kingdom values should infiltrate our politics. Kingdom living should make a difference in our communities. But let us not misunderstand the nature of the kingdom. The kingdom does not advance when trees are planted, or unemployment lowered, or beautiful art is created, or elections go one way or another. Those may all be important things. They may reflect certain values of the kingdom. But the kingdom comes when and where the King is known. When Jesus is loved and worshiped and believed upon, there the kingdom of God is in the midst of you.

But when Jesus came to earth, those kingdom priorities were reflected perfectly in his life. Jesus is God's righteousness revealed. Jesus demonstrated the kingdom in what he did. He showed what happens when God's rule and kingship are experienced here on earth. And just what happens when God's rule and kingship are experienced here on earth? What happens when God answers our prayer, "Thy kingdom come?" Lost people are found. Broken people are healed. Oppressed people are set free. Hungry people are fed. The hurting find comfort. The despairing find hope. The wronged find justice. That's the kingdom! That's what it looks like.

#### **Conclusion: Trusting God**

In other words...we are invited to pray these words of Jesus that the reality of God's kingdom would be known in our world today. You are invited...I am invited, to pray for this "in-breaking shalom of God" to be known here and now. That is huge. That is revolutionary. Don't settle for less.

Like the great preacher Charles Spurgeon once said, "A little faith will take you to heaven, but I pray for the kind of faith that will bring heaven to earth." Did you catch that? "A little faith will take you to heaven, but I pray for the kind of faith that will bring heaven to earth." Thy kingdom come. Friends...if we say that prayer...and really mean it, it has huge implications for how we live our lives. When we say, "Your kingdom come," and we really mean it, we find ourselves invited and enlisted to demonstrate the kingdom in the same way Jesus did. By laying down our lives. By offering them to God, asking that through us the truth of his reign...his loving, benevolent, transforming reign... would be known in the world.

One might talk about the Lord's Prayer as a prayer of trust and hope in God's future. For God's people, hope lies in trusting that God is not yet finished with us or with this world. The already of God's kingdom we experience now will one day give way to that glorious reality of the not yet of God's future. No more suffering, no more tears, no more death. "Mourning and crying and pain will be no more" (Revelation 21:4). In the meantime, until that day, we place our lives and this world in God's hands. We take it stitch by stitch, row by row, word by word, line by line, one day at a time. And in trust, we pray the prayer Jesus taught us, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven."



# LENTEN SIMPLE MEALS

We welcome you all to come to the 2024 Lenten Simple Meals. We will be meeting on Thursday night in Lent beginning on February 22nd. Dinner will begin at 5:30pm and the learning time will begin at 6pm. We will end our time together with music and prayer.

We are especially excited that St. Jude's Episcopal Church will be joining us for meals and learning. And Reverend Susan Anslow Williams will be joining Pastor's Robbie and Lindsey in leading the discussions

Lent is traditionally a time of self-reflection and action that prepares followers of Christ to walk more intentionally in the way of God. Many of us want to understand how to integrate our personal spiritual lives more actively with our engagement in working for justice and expressing compassion to the oppressed and marginalized. We will be studying together a book called Hard and Holy Work, by Pastor Mary Alice Birdwhistell and Hebrew Bible scholar Tyler Mayfield.

Together we will begin a unique Lenten journey, trying to see those who are marginalized or suffering as God sees them; contemplating how privilege, fear, risk, and feelings of uncertainty can cloud our attention; and practice endurance for the messy middle of justice work, leaning on God's provision and rest when the way forward is unclear.

We will challenge each other to become more attuned to God's boundless presence in our world and wake up to and take action for God's justice through exploring stories from the book of Exodus. We hope that you can join us.
