Chances are, you have had a conversation (er... exchange?) with someone you disagreed with this past month. It should be a natural experience to converse with people of differing opinions. However, if that conversation is with someone who is especially toxic or narcissistic it can really be damaging. But what if we are the ones who are toxic or narcissistic? For the next few months I will be exploring how to avoid toxic and narcissistic behavior in our own lives. Using the book of Proverbs and an article from the BBC we will be looking at 5 different ways we can examine ourselves and seek to be better people and friends.

We all avoid conversation with certain people because we know the end result of that conversation will be negative. Allowing the dinner table discussion to slide into politics will always find Uncle Ted bluster about whatever policy or politician and the Hampton Cousins accusing him, and everyone else in the room, as being morally corrupt, political degenerate and socially obtuse. Avoiding speaking about things that are important can save us from argument, but tend to separate us by disengagement far more than we might suppose. Is it possible to have a civil and constructive conversation with people who do not agree with you?

I believe it is. We have no constructive power over people who are expressing toxic and narcissistic behavior. However, we do have power (and the moral duty) to examine our own behavior and avoid negative tendencies. This is especially important in our current, tense political atmosphere. How can we practically approach this?

Validating does not mean agreeing

A marker of a good relationship is one in which we feel secure to share our feelings. We 'try on' ideas and express emotions in a close relationship that would not be appropriate to share in a larger group. It is a natural and healthy thing to validate the feelings shared. This becomes very difficult when topics are circling politics and religion. These are subjects that bring up a variety of feelings, but we tend to mask our feelings by the intensity of our discussion. Attempting to be objective, we fail to talk about our true feelings. We can be so amped about the religious and political topics that we fail to identify personal feelings to the point that we may be unaware that we have feelings at all.

In our sickness we replace emotions with political alliances and theological slants. We can argue our points with the fervor and deeply wound each other because while we think we are discussing politics, theology or scriptural analysis, but the unacknowledged feelings seep out. Convolution abounds, we cease to be able to identify what is feeling and what is objective topic, and what should be polite dinner talk has devolved into an all out brawl.

In order to avoid toxic conversation it is important to ask, "How does that make you feel?" We can validate each others feelings without affirming each other's politics, but we need to identify those feelings first. We may never find agreement on particular policies, but we should be able to sympathize with each other when we say, "I fear such and such because of this and that." Taking the time to get to this place in a conversation can led to more healthy relationships.

Beware of Venting, discourage the Gossip

It is a passive toxicity when an individual is allowed to simply vent and all feelings are accepted and agreed with. While this creates an emotional bond in the moment it does not allow for the emotional growth that true reflection brings. Either the listener is parasitically feeding off of the other's emotion or the unfiltered emotion is left out in the air to grow fetid. A Spiritual perspective would suggest that sharing a revelation from God and discussing the meaning of such an event is only half-baked until you commit to actually doing something about how God has revealed himself to you. Revelation is only as helpful as the willingness to obey God's call. Venting our emotion is only good so far as there is proper reflection of why we might feel that and what it might mean to us. We need those who we are in conversation with to be willing to hold us accountable to what we have experienced and what we feel.

While it is clear that sharing feelings and receiving an empathetic response from a listener does ease stress. It allows us to safely 'process' experiences and share emotional weight. However, studies would suggest that emotional venting without an invitation to reflect can many times lead to damaging 'rumination' and a long-term increase in stress.

This is one of the reasons that Gossip can be so damaging. Gossip is very attractive. All of us want to be seen as knowledgeable and 'in the know'. Sharing unsubstantiated and/or negative perspectives about another person with a third person does create a temporary emotional connection. But if there is no reflection, no call to growth, no identification of the underlaying feelings that are being masked by the gossip topic at hand, it can be just as destructive to the bearer of such information as to the subject of the gossip! Genuine relationships are not made, nor are they nurtured, by the sharing of Gossip. So how do should we act in light of this?

We find in Proverbs 27 a helpful thought:

5 Better is open rebuke
than hidden love.
6 Well meant are the wounds a friend inflicts,
but profuse are the kisses of an enemy.

This doesn't seem like a safe idea. Uncle Ted isn't going to take kindly to 'open rebukes'. How does this create healthy relationships? How can we be successful in our roles of encouraging reflection?

Much depends on the quality of relationship that you have with the other person. Ethan Kross at the University of Michigan has a few questions that may help us.

- Looking at the situation, could you tell me why this event was stressful to you?
 What is really being expressed here? What emotions are in play? What ultimate concerns are being threatened?
- Have you learned anything from this experience, and if so, would you mind sharing it with me?
 This is a respectful question that encourages reflection. Even if we don't agree with someone we might learn from them.
- In the grand scheme of things, if you look at the "big picture", does that help you make sense of this experience?
 Why or why not?

When we talk about 'processing' emotions or experiences (specially in a Spiritual sense) we mean we are fixing meaning to those emotions and experiences. This allows us to consider the emotion or experience in its proper proportion and react accordingly. We can 'get through' a great amount of trauma and grief, but not by discounting, masking or misrepresenting our feelings.

Colossians 1: 28 So we preach Christ to everyone. With all possible wisdom we warn and teach them in order to bring each one into God's presence as a mature individual in union with Christ. 29 To get this done I toil and struggle, using the mighty strength which Christ supplies and which is at work in me.

Refugee Welcome Update

February News...

Our English class is really taking off! Each week there are between 20 and 30 students working diligently. There are a few needs here that we would like to meet: help with transportation and donations for supplies (workbooks, pencils, paper, childcare, transportation costs). If you are interested in volunteering or donating please contact me directly.

In addition to English class we have also been active delivering furniture and providing transportation to and from appointments and classes. Thank you to all who donated, picked up, and/or delivered this month!

Looking forward...

I'm certain that you all have seen news regarding funding and policy for refugees. Because of these recent and abrupt changes we have not received any new families or individuals since mid-January. It is unclear when this will resolve. Until then we will continue to support those who are here with us.

Additionally the changes have impacted the families who most recently arrived in Michigan. Funds that were dedicated to these families were frozen before they were able to be utilized and this leaves several families with financial burdens. Samaritas staff have worked around the clock to secure emergency funding, but it is still very difficult and stressful. Normally upon arrival a refugee receives 90 days of intense support from Samaritas and their resettlement allowance (roughly \$1100 per person). This gives them a needed cushion as they adjust to a new home and look for employment. At this time we are actively looking for any and all job leads in the Flint area. If anyone has ideas for funding sources or jobs please let me know.



Now some good news! A very generous donor gifted a car to one of our families. Jesus and Zoraida are ecstatic to have a car of their own! You can see their joy in the photo below.

Finally I would like to address a question that has come up frequently in the past weeks: the families with whom we are working are here legally. They applied for and received refugee status before arriving in the US. Most have been stateless for years having fled dangerous circumstances in their home countries. They all went through the appropriate channels to be granted refuge here.

I also want to share our group's Immediate Needs:

- Support of English Class (see above)
- Delivery of furniture on 2/22/25- from Fenton to Flint
- Delivery of a box of housewares- date is flexible- from Fenton to Flint
- Bus Orientation- We need someone who is willing to take a bus ride with new arrivals to demonstrate how to utilize MTA, payments, routes, apps, etc.
- Toiletries: we have been asked to help with toiletries which can be cost prohibitive. Donations of items and also money are accepted.
